THE SCALES FALLING FROM THEIR EYES.

A great many good men have been deluded by the cry in the North that this war was a "war for the Union." Lincoln's despotism, however, is fast removing the scales from their eyes, and the abolition of slavery in the District of Columbia, the nullificaton of the fugitive slave law by Congress, and the emancipation designs of Mr. Lincoln upon the border slave States is beginning, like medicine, to effect its good work. The people are at last becoming to realize the real object of the North in waging this war, and to see that all this cry about the Union is a miserable cheat. The Maryland Beacon, hitherto a strong Union paper, deserts the Lincoln cause with the following parting compliment:

"We of Maryland have been enlightened a little too late; but at las that the war is waged, not mainly for the restoration of the Union and the honor of the old flag, but chiefly for the abolition of slavery. Intexicated for the moment by the soul-stirring cry of "war for the Union," we have assisted to rob the people of the District of Celumbia, and to render valueless our own slave interest.

"The scales have at last fallen from our eyes, and we see now no longer through a glass, dark. ly. We have been brought to realize that "our patriotic President" is something worse than a promise breaker, and that the Union is a miserable cheat. We may not nowavoid the ruin which is upon ourselves; but it still remains in our power to withdraw our sanction from a war which, it now manifest, is waged against the Confedera States from vindictive motives and mainly for th extirpation of Slavery wherever it exists. Major Henry E. Peyton, who, from services the field at Manassas, was promoted from a pr vate in the Loudoun cavalry to General Beaur gard's staff, took with him to Corinth his boo servant John, who had been his playmate childhood. When the army marched to Sh loh John was left at Corinth. But on Sunda after the battle was over, John turned up myst riously, having come, as he said, to "look aft Mars Henry." As soon as he found his mast

the following colloquy ensued: "Mars Henry, dar is a Yankee horse bin kil ed, and the Yunkee officer done run'd away and left de finis saddle and bridle you never see -Spose'n I and you take um befo' anybody else

Major Peyton, after consulting with some of his brother officers, told John to go and take them. Not leng afterward John returned and said : Mars Henry, dar's a ole mule got loose in de

woods, and presently some body gwine come long dar and steal him. Now spose'a I and you take him and put we all's saddle and bridle on him." "Very good," said the Major, and away went

Sunday night passed, and no John was to be found. The battle raged all day Monday, and still John was not visible. Our army retired slowly to Corinth without any symptoms of John. The Major could not help smiling at his own sim-plicity in permitting John to provide himself with all the means of escape without once suspecting the rascal's design. He had also to receive the ironical compliments of his fellow officers. "Major Peyton's John comin' up de road." Everybody ran out to see him. The first thing that attracted their attention was the brand U S. on the shoulder of an enormous mule. On this mule was a large sack stuffed so full that it stood straight out half a yard on each side of the mule; and on this sack sat John with a large trunk in front of him. A shout of applause greeted him

as he dismounted. The booty in the sack and trunk proved to be very rich.
