A brisk skirmish ensued, resulting in the capture of the number above stated, and the complete discomfiture of the remainder of the detachment. The prisoners think that nearly all

the others were either killed or wounded. These men state that little confidence is felt in the result of the anticipated general engagement by the rank and file of the Federal army. They acknowledge the superiority of our soldiers, and confess that in a land fight they have very little hope of success.
