[From the New York Tribune, July 12.] THE CONFISCATION BILL.

The Confiscation Bill, after apparently a deadlock, was suddenly resuscitated yesterday by the Conference Committee, and a report was agreed upon, made to the House, and passed that body by a vote of 92 to 42.

DOMINIQUE. Another slave being delivered up except for crime or some offense against the laws of the United States, until the claimant shall make out that he has not borne arms in the present rebellion, or given aid and comfort thereto.

THE CONFISCATION BILL. The bill is authorized to seize the property of all such persons and convey the proceeds to the Government. He is to proclaim that in 62 days.

THE CONFISCATION BILL. Slaves of persons engaged in rebellion, or who give aid and comfort to the rebels, that take refuge in our lines, shall be held as captives of war, and forever free from slavery.

THE CONFISCATION BILL. The effort to pass the passage of this important bill was very timely: a point of order by Mr. Mallory, one hour, Mr. Cox, both overruled, and a motion to table it from Mr. Allen, which got but 42 votes, was all.
