At daylight, Wednesday morning, the battle was renewed by a general and simultaueons attack upon our whole fines the enemy at the same time continuing his effort, begun on the evening before, to outflank us on the right. The battle raged all day with a fury unexampled in this war. Again and again repulsed, the enemy rallied his columns and returned to the charge with desperate determination. At every point he was met valour of our troops. The shades of evening set-tled over the field, but still the fight went on, along a line extending over several miles, with unabated fury. The combat seemed for a time to deepen as the night wore on. The dead and wounded of both sides lay mingled together, covening acres of ground. It appeared as though mutual extermination would alone put a stop to the carnage. The representative champions of the two sections of the once glorious Union had crossed their bayonets for the first time on neutral territory; the martial prowess of the two sections had been brought to the grand test, and every man in each army seemed determined to conquer or to die upon that field.

Notwithstanding the courage and obstinacy of the enemy, Longstreet had, during the day, armies, at nine o'clock the enemy's fire slackened possession of the field.

On Thursday morning the enemy, contrary to expectation, did not renew the fight, and had not done so up to one o'clock P. GEN. BRAXTON BRAGG.

It is known to our readers that Gen. Bragg has been brought prominently before the people of the Confederacy, by the introduction of a resolution in the Confederate Senate, proposing an in vestigation of the charge against him of ordering the execution of soldiers in the army commanded by him, without trial: A correspondent of the Mobile Register, who signs himself "Justice," communicates to that journal "the circumstances under which every man was shot during the time Bethel and Corinth until a few weeks previous to his departure from Tupelo."-According to this writer the first three executions power: were preceded by trial before Court Martial .-The fourth was ordered by the General commanding the pickets, "without referring the case to otic and criminal conduct; sernestly hoping that a who are disinclined to defend their nomes treasured General Bragg or the General commanding,"and his action "was approved by every officer and sol dier' who spoke about'the case in the hearing of "Justice." The fifth case, which occasioned the introduction of the resolution in the Senate, is referred to as follows by the writer:

No. 5 - I will mention here a fact which every good officer and man, who has been any length by their patriotic valor have driven the enemy back of time in the army, knows, when an army is facing or fronting another, a man lays 'himsolf liable to be shot if he fires his gun (except by accident) without the order from his officer, or to give alarm to the camp of the approach of the enemy, as it is only in this way that our army can be kept from being surprised at any and all times. Upon the first day's march from Corinth | 18th day of September, 1862. our men continued to fire at random on anything which struck their fancy, Gen Bragg, knowing how fatal such conduct and want of discipline might prove to his army, in the event of the enemy attempting to cut us off on the right or left. To my knowledge he repeatedly sent orders to the Brigade and Regimental commanders to have the shooting stopped, or he would otherwise be compelled for the security of his army, to make an example of some one. These orders were not regarded, though I believe the commanders used every effort to suppress it. On the second day of our retreat, the firing having again commenced. the General was compelled to force obedience to his orders. A young man, I believe from Arkansas-name not recollected-in violation of orders, fired his gun at a chicken in the yard of a farmer and killed a young negro, said to be valuable, and one which the owner could jily afford to I se .-Here was a case for an example, and it was made. These were the only executions, to the best of my knowledge and belief, which took place during the whole time that Gen. Bragg was in Tennesssee and North Mississippi. If there was any others I never heard of them; nor do I believe they ever occurred, as I have every opportunity of

knowing. Of the five cases above mentioned, General' Bragg was called upon to approve only two, the other three being beyond his jurisdiction .-This statement is made as a matter of simple justice to General Bragg, and to set those right who unintentionally, and from want of proper information on the subject, have done a wrong to the character of one of our greatest Generals, and as pure and Christian a patriot as we have in our Confederacy.

VANCE, Governor of North Carolina, do issue this my proclamation, warning all such persons to desist from such unpatrieither by reason of age, infirmity or cowardice, will cease to dissuade those who are willing; and notitying positively all persons contemplating an armed re sistance to the law, if there really be any such wis guided and evil-disposed persons in our midst, that they will commit the crime of treason, according to the Constitution, and must not expect to escape its penalties. . Whilet thousands upon thousands of our best and bravest have cheerfully obeyed the law, and to the Potomac, it would be an intolerable outrage upon them to permit others to evade the law, or worse still, to resist it by open violence. Let no one, therefore, be deceived; the law will be enforced, and I appeal to all loyal and patriotic citizens to sustain those who are charged with its execution.
