Mr. Editor :- Certainly there is no histor written of a people who exhibited more unanimi ty, or ralled more promptly or generally to the sistance of tyranny and oppression, than the people of theConfederate States. NOTHER CONVENTION OF GOVERNORS-THEIR

PLANS FOR PROSECUTING THE WAR. The Cincinnati correspondent of the New

York Herald asserts positively that the agitators

In order to bring to bear directly upon Mr. Lincoln this pressure of official influence, they are to assemble in Washington within ten days, at a conference which is to be attended by all the Governors of the loyal States, except Gov. Morgan, of New York, who will not join in with them, and then present the following demands to to President Lincoln :

1. The removal of Major General McClellan from the command of the Army of the Potomac. and the appointment of Major General Joseph Hocker to that position. 2. The supplanting of Gen. Buell by some more energetic General; and

3. The rigorous prosecution of the war, the mmediate advance of the army of the Potomac. he enforcement of the confiscation act, and finally, the recognition of the war as a rebellion, and the treatment of rebels in arms as traiters. and not as ordinary belligerents.

If the President declines to accede to ropositions, and neglects to carry them out, the Sovernors will refuse to furnish any more troops to the army, and will, it is rumored, attempt to place some one in a position where the President's uthority will not be needed to effect the object desired.

In plain language, it is rumored that a mili ary dictator will be appointed, who will carry on the war vigorously and successfully. I do not andorse the truth the last rumor ; but I am inelined to place faith in it myself. I am quite satisfied of the correctness of the statement that no moore troops will be given until such changes as the Governors desire in the commands of the Eastern and Western armies are effected.

I understand that Governors Morton, of Indiana, and Yates, of Illinois, went to Louisville vesterday to gather facts bearing upon Buell and is campaign, and his conduct in the same, which they propose to lay before the Convention and the President, to show the necessity of his removal.

Having obtained these facts, they will procee to day to Columbus, where they will be joined y Governor Todd, and then push on Mast to Washington, Governor Cuctin will join the party at Herrisburg, and Governors Kirkwood, of Iowa, Blair, of Michigan, and other Western Governors, will proceed by another route to Washington, where they expect to find the Eastern Executives. Gov. Morgan, it is understood, will not unite with them, as he desires to sustain Honest Abraham in his present policy.

The Convention may be postponed by some contingency that may arise, but I have reason to believe that it will take place at an early day next week.

THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONSARE

THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS ARE published for the information of those persons wishing to draw bonnty of deceased Soldiers, in ac-cordance with an Ordinance of the Convention, Rat-ified the 22d day of February, 1863 : REGULATIONS. 1. The payment of bounty to the representatives of deceased soldiers is based upon the certificate of the commanding officer of the company, who will state the time of unlistment of the soldier, the date of his decease in accurate the amount of housts. decease in service, the amount of bounty already paid by the State, and the company and regiment to which he belonged: uses 140

2. The claimant will make affidavit before a magin trate that he or she is the next of kin to the decease according to the provisions of the foregoing ordi-nance of the Convention, and there is no other per-son entitled to make claim. The affidavit of the claimant must be sustained by that of one disinter-ested witness, that the facts stated are correct within his own knowledge, and that he has no interest in the claim. The magistrate administering the oath will certify to the credibility of the witness, and the clerk of the County Court will certify, under seal, that he is an authorized and acting magistrate.

will be made to the guardian, upon the proper certif-cate, under the seal of the Court, of his appointment and the sufficiency of his bond-the claim to be proved by him as in other cases.

4. A bounty of fifty dollars, deducting the bounty that may have been previously paid, is due to all per-sons who may have volunteered for three years or the war, and to all persons mustered into or continued in service under the provisions of the Conscription Act. IMPORTANT FROM TENNESSEE-SUR-RENDEROF NASHVILLE DEMANDED -THE CITY TO BE SHELLED AND BURNED IN CASE OF REFUSAL.

CHATTANOOGA' Oct. 31 .- it is stated by several gentlemen, who left Mufreesboro' on the 29th that Breckinzidge had given Gen. Negley two days in which to remove the women and children from Nashville, At the expiration of this period, Nashville is to be surrendered or shelled and hurned.

General John Morgan is said to be on the North and Forrest on the South of Nashville. Breckinridge is at Lavergne.

Morgan has about thirty pieces of artillery. Breckinridge and Forrest have about sixty pieces of artillery.

Several ladies have left Nashville. The Yankees did not even inspect their baggage. Per-mits were readily granted by the Abolition authorities

CONDITION OF OUR WOUNDED AT CORINTH-ROSECRANS DECLARES THE FIGHTING OF OUR TROOPS UN-EQUALLED.

MOBILE, Nov. 1st. — A special dispatch to the Advertiser and Register, dated the 31st, says that Surgeon Board, of Price's Division, who was left with our wounded at Corinth, returned to-day in Rosecrans, ambulance. He left four hundred of our wounded at Iuka, and two hundred distributed in the country. They are well fed and cared for, and have twenty Confederate Surgeons with them.

Rosecrans has been very attentive to our woun-ded. He declares such fighting never was equalled, and such brave men are entitled to every attention. The only thing they require is clothing, of which they are in great need. Three hundred suits will be sent them. Rosecrans, in tears, met our Surgeons after the battle, and expressed regret that such brave men should suffer so severely. His Adjutant declared that had Price's command been supported, or the other troops handled as well, the Confederates would have held Corinth.

The Federals finding our troops had gained the centre of the town, his ordnance buildings were fired, and were with difficulty extinguished after Green's brigade fell back for want of support.

THE YANKEES ATTACK A VESSEL AT-TEMPTING TO RUN THE BLOCKADE.

We learn by a gentleman just from Masonborough Sound, that early this morning the blockaders commenced firing on a large English brig, supposed to be engaged in running the blockade. The brig was run ashore off Masonboro'. At about 8 o'clock, the blockaders commenced firing on the State Salt Works. As we go to press the firing is plainly heard in town. We do not know the damage to brig has sustained. She had not been taken possession of when our informant left. We will endeavor to get the facts by te-morrow.

Wilmington Journal of Tuesday. The Journal of Wednesday has the following account of the further proceedings of the Yankee gunboats, from which it will be seen they succeded in destroying the vessel :

All day yesterday the town resounded with the reports of heavy guns, which did not cease until sundown.

These guns were fired from two blockaders at a barque hoisting English colors;-the barque was run ashore. The firing commenced abreast of the Salt works at Fowler's point. The blockaders fired many shot and shell at the barque, a number of which passing over fell into the vicinity of the Salt Works, but did little or no injury to the works, all hands from which retired to Mr. Beasley's, about a mile off.

By night the barque was completely destroyed. It is said that at night the blockaders sent out a party to finish the work of destruction. Some twenty-one of the party from the blockaders who landed on the beach, were unable to make their way back to their vessels, and were made prisoners by a portion of the Scotland Neck Cavalry. There are among these prisoners three commissioned officers. Col. Lamb had got his long range seige

If this news should turn out not to be true hereafter, it is no proof that it was not true when it was first announced. If the convention should not be held, it will only be because the premature publication of the programme shall have disconcerted the plans of the conspirators. Their objects at Providence and Altoona, and the objects which they contemplate at Washington, are the same. Their design is to put Mr. Lincoln under their feet, to virtually and practically nullify the Federal authority, and to act as independently as the Southern rebels.

AN INCIDENT.

A correspondent of the Petersburg Express narrates the following incident:

On Tuesday, the 1st of July, 1862, an old man with the air and eye of command, might have been seen sturdily and with a true soldier step, wending ...ls way down the road that led from Richmond to Malvern Hill, destined to the scene of the last and bloodiest stand of McClellan on the Peninsula.-His trusty "Enfield" was thrown across his shoulder, and a well filled cartridge box demonstrated his ability to do what his resolute demeanor proclaimed his intention. Every straggler he passodand though an old man, he passed many-he urged with entreaty, with threats and with scoffs, to hasten with him to the post of duty. To the weak he spoke a kindly word of encouragement, to the skulkers a scorching sarcasm, and if you had asked him whither he was wending that July day, he would have answered, "to take my son's place in the ranks, as he is too sick to move to-day, and his company is after the enemy." And thus the gallant old chieftain trudged on his eighteen miles. That son was and is a member of the Petersburg Riflemen, and as thorough a gentleman and chivalrous a soldier as the Southern Confederacy holds, and that father was General Walter Gwynn, who has at last, as I see by to-day's Express, been assigned to duty.

AN IMPORTANT SUGGESTION.

In the Grenada Appeal we find the following communication :

Tanners and shoemakers are exempt from conscription by the laws of the Confederate States. but there is one little provision of those laws which they all seem to have entirely overlooked. It is this: "That the products of their labor shall be sold at prices not exceeding seventy-five per sent upon the cost of production." Now I will venture to say that there is not a tanner or shoemaker in Mississippi who is not selling his products at from one hundred to five hundred pea cent. upon the cost of production. All such are no longer exempt from conscription. Now, let every man who buys a hide of leather, or a pair of shoes from these exempts, take a receipt for his purchases, which will be proof positive against them that they are liable to be enrolled as conscripts. If they refuse to give a receipt, let the purchaser make a memorandum of his purchases. their date and amount, and this will answer just as well as a receipt to prove them liable to conscrip-

The laws to which I have referred are equally applicable to other tradesmen ; but I have confined my remarks to tanners and shoemakers, alone, simply because their exorbtiant prices press peculiarly hard upon the people, particularly the poor people, at this season of the year. The man who is not satisfied with seventy-five per cent. profit upon the cost of his productions, is the very man to be put in the army, where he will have to buy at his own prices. It is a beautiful sight, isn't it, to see a stout, fat, hearty exempt, selling a pair of course brogans at five and six dollars a pair to a war worn, barefooted soldier, that did
