## A Proclamation.

**THE RETURNS** of the Election of Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday of November instant, it being the seventh day of the month, the time appointed by the act of Congress, and in conformity with the regulations of the Statutes of the State, have been received at the Executive Office, from the Sheriffs of the several Counties. (Yancy only excepted) within the period prescribed by Law.  
And the same having been collated, to ascertain the result of said Election, it is found to be as follows, that is to say:

**KENNETH RAYNER**,  
**HENRY W. MILLER**,  
**WILLIAM H. WASHINGTON**,  
**GEORGE DAVIS**,  
**JOHN WINSLOW**,  
**JOHN KERR**,  
**RAWLEY GALLOWAY**,  
**JAMES W. OSBORNE**,  
**TOD R. CALDWELL**,  
**and JOHN BAXTER**,  
each received Thirty-three Thousand Four Hundred and twenty-one votes, **EDWARD STANLY** Forty-three Thousand Four Hundred and nineteen votes.  
And **THOMAS BRAGG, JR.**,  
**ASA BIGGS**,  
**PERRIN BUSBEE**,  
**GEORGE S. STEVENSON**,  
**SAMUEL J. PERSON**,  
**CADWALLADER JONES**,  
**JUNIUS S. CLEMMONS**,  
**and WILLIAM W. AVERY**,  
each received Thirty-four Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-nine votes.  
**WILLIAM S. ASHE** and **GREEN W. CALDWELL**, Thirty-four Thousand Eight Hundred and sixty-eight votes. **JESSE R. WEAYER**, Thirty-four Thousand six hundred and forty-one votes.—**WILLIAM H. THOMAS**, Two hundred and thirty-seven votes. And eleven other persons sixty-one votes each, and seven others ten votes each.  
Now, therefore, I, **WILLIAM A. GRAHAM**, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim and make known, that Kenneth Rayner, Edward Stanly, Henry W. Miller, William H. Washington, George Davis, John Winslow, John Kerr, Rawley Galloway, James W. Osborne, Tod R. Caldwell, and John Baxter, have been duly chosen as Electors, on behalf of this State, of President and Vice President of the United States, for four years from and after the fourth day of March next. And I do in like manner, notify and warn them, and each of them, to attend in the Capitol at Raleigh, on the first Wednesday in December next, it being the sixth day thereof, to form an Electoral College, and to vote for President and Vice President as aforesaid, according to the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the United States.  
In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the Great Seal of the State of North Carolina to be affixed.  
Done at the City of Raleigh, this 18th day of November, A. D. 1848, and of our Independence, the 73d.
