State of North Carolina Rule Co.,

Courts of Pleas and Quarter Sessions,

May Term, 1851.

ORDERED; that all Petitions for closing or establishing Public Roads shall be filed for hearing on the first day of each Term, and no notice can be heard on any other day of the Term, without a special order appointing any particular day to be heard on another day of the Term, which special order must be made at a Term preceding or subsequent for a duplicate of said warrant, or for payment of fees.
