The salary of all the judges of Federal Courts is, however, to be raise to a liberal standard. They have been too low for some time, but are still higher than the salaries generally allowed to the State judges, who, in taking office, rely for their support as much upon their private fortunes as their salaries. Much of the best legal talent of the States is therefore excluded from the bench, and instances have not been unusual of the resignation of judgships-for clerkships.

The new salary bill will undoubtedly enable the federal government to employ "higher order of legal ability on the judicial bench than can be done by the States. While this is the case, there is no danger of the want of a proper appreciation of the
