THE NEW YORK CHURCH TENURE LAW .-- The bill in relation to church property passed by a the New York Legislature, and which is now a law, declares all future conveyance to Priests, Bishops, and other ecclesiastics in their official character or as corporation sole, void. The Tribune says.

It also declares void all future conveyances of lands consecrated to religious purposes, mnless made to a religious corporation organized in conformity to the statutes of the State, which require such corporations to consist of at least three trustees, and not to have an annual revenue of more than \$3,000, excepting the Ministers, Elders and Deacons of the Reformed Protestant Dutch church Vestrymen of Trinity church, New York; and the HOSIERY, GLOVES, &C.
