LOUISVILLE, August 7, 11 A. M. The elections for Governor, members of Congress, members of Legislature, etc., came off yes-

terday. I regret to state that in this city, they were characterized by some of those bloody demonstrations, which of late have so often disgraced our elections. So far as heard from, they have resulted generally in favor of the American ticket. In this city the American candidates receive a majority of sixteen hundred.

Bloody riots occurred in the First and Eighth Wards. Several persons were killed. The Irish fired on the Americans and killed three. One Irishman was then forcibly seized by a mob, and hung between two blocks of buildings from which the shots were fired.

The result throughout the State is thought to be favorable to the American ticket.

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

The Americans now commenced, (the firing from the windows continuing,) and burnt the Brewery, and sacked the houses of the foreigners. In the Eighth Ward, three Americans were at- Democra ic majority. tacked by an Irish mob with firearms, and one killed, while others were wounded. The Irish also went into a house, fired on the crowd outside and Philadelphia, August 5 .- The steamer General killed two Americans.

The American's now having become perfectly exasperated at the murder of their comrades, broke into the house, and captured the murderers, one of whom was immediately hung in the public street. A member of the police cut him down before he was dead but he was afterwards shot, and died this morning. Meanwhile, a perfect fusilade of rifle and gun-shots, was kept up from a row of Irish houses in the Americans that were passing. Several persons were wounded.

The Americans rushed in and fired the buildings some twelve in number, all of which were burnt to the ground.

The Americans being now largely reinforced. brought out a large number of cannon and muskets, and some Irish were shot, while others were captured. No attempts whatever were made to stay the flames.

The Americans becoming infuriated next marched off to the office of the Daily Times, and that establishment was only saved from destruction by the strenuous efforts of Mr. George D. Prentice of the Louisville Journal and others.

This morning at eleven o'clock, a large mob attacked a row of Irish houses on the Levee. Some shots are reported to have been fired.

The mob is now partially restrained, and efforts are being made to restore order.

STEAMBOAT COLLISION-EIGHT LIVES LOST-MacDonald, which started from this city last night,

on an excursion to Cape May, got up by Mr. Jarrett. of Baltimore, met with a sad accident in the Delaware river. About 9 o'clock, the steamer, when off the Lazaretto, came in collision with the schooner G. Pease, which struck her on the larboard side, raking the wheel house, &c., clear aft, doing considerable damage. Some eight or ten persons who were in the barber shop, were swept overboard and crowned before assistance could reach them. Their names are not known.

The schooner sustained but little damage. The accident caused quite a disappointment to a large number of excursionists from Baltimore. who were waiting at New Castle for the arrival of the steamer, the accident compelled them to

return home, without accomplishing the trip to the Capes.

SECOND DISPATCH. PHILADELPHIA. - August 5. - The McDonald had but 150 passengers on board it being designed to take a large number of Baltimoreans up at New Casile. The schooner showed a light, but the night was so dark and stormy, that the pilot was deceived as to the distance. Most of them being strangers it is impossible to give the names of the lost or the exact number. All accounts agree that there were ten or twelve persons in the barber

shop at the time of the disaster, all of whom must have been crushed to death and drowned being carried overboard. The steamer struck the schooner on the larboard side and the boom of the latter entered the barber shop, crush ug everything in its course, carrying away the wheel house and all
