The average number of deaths, for some weeks past, may be safely set down at 70 per day; or one per cent. of the whole each day, or one-tenth in ten days. This greatly exceeds any mortality which has ever been known in this country. The pages of modern history do not afford a parailel.

In 1665, during the great plague in London, there were 100,000 deaths in 13 months, in a population of 1,000,000, giving one-tenth in a little over one month. In Norfolk and Portsmouth we have had one-tenth in ten days.

The reign of death has never, in modern times, been so terrible as now. Future historians will point to Norfolk and Por smouth as the most terribly scourged cities in he modern history of the world. 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
