A STRUGGLE FOR LIFE.

THRILLING INCIDENT OF THE SULTANA EXPLOSION.

Among the few who survived the horrible results of the explosion and burning of the steamer Sultana on the Mississippi riv-er near Memphis, was Mrs. Perry, of Cin-cinnati, wife of Mr. C. Perry, chief enginee of the war vessel Ton lessee.

At the time of the accident Mrs. Perry was returning from a visit to her husband, whose vessel was then lying near the month of Red river.

As soon as the explosion took place Mrs. Perry fastened on a life preserver and sprang into the river at the stern of the boat, and immediately found herself float-ing in the midst of soldiers, horses, and all the debris incident to a wreck. Together with several soldiers, she managed to secure a door, which helped to sustain them in the water as they floated down the deep and rapid current of the mighty river, with which for long, dreary hours they were doomed to struggle for life-their own feeble strength opposed to the overpowering flood.

The hours of their terrible suffering passed on slowly as they floated down the river, passed Memphis, and many miles beyond. Of the gloomy half dozen companions, the lady and a young soldier, boyish in years, but manly and noble in deed, were the most self-possessed, for they alone raised their voices in words of encouragement or advice. The others, men who have faced death on the battlefields and in rebel prisons, were as babes in that trying hour. They wept aloud, and the waters echoed back their shrieks of utter despair.

One of them crawled upon the door and remained there, to the imminent peril of the others, and despite their repeated remonstrances. Another, who observed that Mrs. Perry had on a life preserver, let go of the door, and grasped her arm, forcing her under the water. She managed to shake him off and regain the door, he taking his place by her side again.

The young hero of the hour here re-monstrated with the other soldier, saying that be was ashamed to see him thus cowardly, after having fought with him on more than one battle ground. Hap-pening to perceive another door floating near them, Mrs. Perry attempted to secure it, but as she was about to lay hands Flour per 1b., on it, a soldier, who had been clinging to it, arose to the surface and warned her off.

She stated that the other poor refuge was so crowded that it would be impossible for all to cling to it. She then attempted to catch hold of the door, but the soldier thrust her off into the water, and compelled her to return to the other. Such were a few incidents which occurred to these survivors of this horrible catastrophe, and when we consider them as happening in the midst of the icy waters of the Mississippi, a mile from shore, and with the inky blackness of night above and around rbemawe can faintly conceive of their

A few logs which had been caught near a small submerged island, at last afforded a halting place to the half dead castaways, and, when day dawned, they were rescued by men with a skiff. Mrs. Perry was then taken to Memphis, experiencing the utof Memphis and his wife, General Washburne, Captain Smith, and the Captains of the steamers Marble City and Naugatuck. She is now slowly recovering from the effects of her terrible sufferings in the wa-

Delirium Tremens.

He had been warned of his danger, but refused to hear the warning. At last his destruction came as with the whirlwind. Distress and anguish came upon him. All anodynes were powerless to quiet his nerves; and so dreadful was his suffering that it could have scarcely been greater had he been tortured with fire. The reptiles and fiends which crawled over him and mocked him, to him seemed real. At last he rose in his bed with a terrific shriek and fell back

His last expression was, "I see the devil!" His boon companions were frightened away from his bedside, and not one of them had courage to see him buried.

Now, shall we call this disease and shattered nerves? or shall we affirm that such a man shows how much material there is in his body and soul with which to kindle and feed suffering? Impart to such a man immortality, and what less than hell have you for him? I believe there is a place called hell, and such facts as I have just referred to, make me sure that there is a condition of being in a sinner "let alone" of God's mercy, which may aply be called hell also:

The following rules are published for the government of Freedmen in Northe arolina, until the restoration of civil government in the State:

I. The common laws governing the domestic relations, such as those giving parents authority and control over their children, and guardians control over their words, are in force. The parent's or guardian's authority and obligations take the place of those of the former master. II. The former masters are constituted the guardians of minors and of the aged and infirm, in the absence of

parents er other near relatives capable of supporting III. Young men and women, under twenty-one years of age, remain under the control of their parents or guardians until they become of age, thus aiding to support their parents, and younger brothers and sisters. IV. The former masters of freedmen may not turn away the young or the infirm, nor refuse to give them food and

shelter; nor may the able-bodied men or women go away from their homes, or live in idleness, and leave their par ents, children, or young brothers and sisters to be supported by others. V. Persons of age, who are free from any of the obligations referred to above, are at liberty to find new homes wherever they can obtain proper employment; but they will not be supported by the government, nor by their

former master, unless they work. VI. It will be left to the employer and servant to agree upon the wages to be paid; but freedmen are advised that for the present season they ought to expect only moderate wages, and where their employers cannot pay them money, they ought to be contented with a tair share in the crops

to be raised. They have gained their personal freedom By industry and good conduct they may rise to independ-VII. All officers, soldiers and citizens are requested to give publicity to these rules, and to instruct the freed

people as to their new rights and obligations.

VIII. All officers of the Army, and of the county police companies, are authorized and required to correct any riolation of the above rules within their jurisdiction. IX Each District Commander will appoint a superinten-dent of freedmen, (a commissioned officer.) with such number of assistants (officers and non-commissioned officers) as may be pecessary, whose duty it will be to take charge of all the freed people in his District, who are without homes or proper employment. The superintendents will send back to their homes all who have left them in violation of the above rules, and will endeaver to find homes and suitable employment for all others. They will provide suitable camps or quarters for such as cannot be otherwise provided for, and attend to their discipline,

sistence, &c. X. The superintendents will hear all complaints of guardians or wards, and report the facts to their District commanders who are authorized to dissolve the existing relations of guardians and ward in any case which may seem to require it, and to direct the superintendent to otherwise provide for the wards, in accordance with the above rules. hostile armies, will be temporarily supplied, as far as practicable, upon application to the nearest Provost Marshal, by loans of the captured property in rossession of the Quartermaster's Pepartment. The needy will also be supplied, for the time being, with subsistence stores from the Commissary Department.

It will be left to the Judicial Department of the Government to punish those political leaders who are responsible for secession, rebellion, and civil war, with all its horrors. Between the Government of the United States and the people of North Carolina there is peace.

And it is recommended to the freed men that, when allowed to do so, they remain with their former masters and labor faithfully so long as they shall be treated kindly and paid reasonable wages; or that they immediately seek em-ployment elsewhere in the kind of work to which they are accustomed. It is not well for them to congregate about towns or military camps. They will not be supported in

All the members will be required to take the oath of allegiance to the Government of the United States, and an oath to preserve the peace, prevent crime, and arrest criminals as far as practicable within their County, and to obey all lawful orders of the United States Military au-

The following regulations are announced and will be observed, in discharging from service such Volunteers as are, hereafter, to be mustered out with their regimental or company organisations:

I. Army Corps, or at least the Divisions thereof, will be kept intact, and immediately upon receipt of an order di-recting any portion of the forces to be mustered out, Com-

manding Generals of Armies and Departments will order the said troops (if not already thereat) to one of the follow-Niddle Military Division and troops of other Armies Departments arriving therein—Defences of Washington, D. C., Harper's Ferry, Va., and Cumberland, Md. 2. Military Division of the James Richmond and Old

6. Military Division of the Missouri-Little Rock, Ark., St. Louis, Mo., and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.
7. Department of the Cumberland—Nashville, Knozville, and Memphis, Tenu. 8. Degartment of Kentucky-Louisville. 9. Middle Department-Baltimore, Md. Commanding Generals of Armies and Departments are

authorized to change the aforesaid places of rendezvous, should the public interest so demand For the Departments of the East, Pennsylvania, Northern, North West, New Mexico, and Pacific, such specia, orders will be given from the Adjutant General's Officel relative to the troops therein serving, as may be de-manded by circumstances, as the time fer discharge is ap-

II. In case of one or more regiments of a Division being mustered out—the Division remaining in the field—said regiment, or regiments, will be mustered out at the place where found serving at the time, and then placed en route to the State, as hereinafter directed. III. The Adjutant General of the Army will designate places of rendezvous in the respective States, to which the regiments, after mustered out, will be forwarded for pay-

IV. Upon arrival at the rendezvous where the musters out are to take place, a critical examination of the regimental and company records, books, &c., will be made, and, in case of omissions, the proper commanders will be made to supply them, and make all the entries as enjoined by the Army Regulations At the same time the muster ou rolls will be commenced, and prepared, in accordance with existing regulations, under the direction of the Assistant Commissaries of Musters of Divisions, superintended by the Corps Commissaries. Corps and Department commanders will see that the work is pushed with energy, and executed promptly, using to this end Division and Brigade commanders to superintend it, and their respective staff officers, to aid the Mustering Officers in collecting the data for the muster out rolls, and discharge papers, as well as the preparation of the same In framing the rolls, partic-ular care must be exercised in stating balances of bounty

payable. [See General Orders, No. 84, current series from this Office.] V So soon as the rolls of a regiment are completed, the said command, with its arms, colors and necessary equipage, will be placed en route to its State, and to the rendezvous therein, at or nearest which it was mustered in En route, and after arrival in the State, the following

1. Immediately on arrival at the State Rendezvous, the regiment will be reported to, and taken control of, by the Chief Mustering Officer for the State, or his Assistant at the point. The said officers will lend all needful assistance in their power to the Paymasters, with the view to prompt payment of the troops.

2. The regimental officers will be held to a strict accountability for the discipline of their commands, and preservation of public property.

8. The Commissary of Musters of the Division to which

the regiment belonged in the field, will take possession of the copies of muster out rolls intended for the Field and Staff, Companies and Paymaster, also the company and regimental records, with all surplus blank rolls, returns, discharges, &c., in possession of regimental and company commanders, or other officers, and after boxing them up, place them whilst en route, under the special charge of a discreet and responsible officer of the regiment. The sole duty of said officer, will be to vare for and preserve said rolls and records whilst en route, and on arrival at the State Rendezvous, where payment is to be made to turn them over to the Chief Mustering Officer, or his Assistant at that place.

4. Paymasters will be designated by the Pay Department to meet regiments at the designated State Rendezvous, and there make final payments, obtaining for that purpose the rolls from the Mustering Officer thereat. 5. Whilst troops are awaiting payment, supplies will be furnished by the respective Supply Departments, on the usual requisitions and returns, countersigned by the Chief Mustering Officer or his Assistant.

6. Until after payment, and the final discharge of th

troops, the Chief Mustering Officer will look to their being kept together and under discipline.

7. The Chief Mustering Officer will, under regulation to be established by himself take possession of and careto be established by himself, take possession of, and carefully preserve, the regimental and company records, also the colors with the respective regiments, and hold them subject to the orders from the Adjutant General of the 8. As soon as practicable, after arrival at the State Ren

Departments concerned. VIII. What is prescribed in the foregoing for a regiment, will be applicable to a battery of artillery, or an independent company.

IX. At the respective State Bendezvous, the following is

ordered, viz:

1. The Paymaster General will be prepared to have a sufficient force of Paymasters, to insure prompt payments.

2. The Quartermaster General, and Commissary General of Subsistence, will be prepared to have a suitable num-

ber of officers of their respective Bureaux, to provide supplies, transportation, &c., and receipt for public prop-

supplies, transportation, &c., and receipt for public property.

5. The Chief of Ordnance will arrange to have a suitable number of officers of his Bureau, to receive the arms, accountrements, &c.

X. The attention of Commanding Generals of Armies and Departments, is directed to the importance of Regimental and Company officers, baving their records so completed and arranged, that, at any time, the muster out rolls may be prepared without delay.

Balances of bounties payable to volunteers when honorally mustered out and discharged, on account of the Government no longer requiring their services.

I. Veterans, who enlisted under the provisions of General Orders, No. 191. series of 1863, from this office, and the extensions thereof, (General Orders, No. 824 and 897, of 1863; 20 and 92, of 1864,) and recruits, (not veterans,) who enlisted for three (8) years, or the war, under the provisions of the Circular Le ter of October 24, 1863, from the Provost Marshal General's Bureau, and its modifications, are, on their honorable muster out and discharge from the service of the United States, before the expiration of their respective terms of enlistment, entitled to the tion of their respective terms of enlistment, entitled to the unpaid balances of their bounties promised them by the orders and laws under which they enlisted.

orders and laws under which they enlisted.

IL. A volunteer accepted and mustered into service under the act of July 4th, 1804. (General Orders, No. 224, Adjutant General's Office, 1864, whether for the term of one. (1) two, (2) or three (8) years, is, on muster out of service, before the expiration of the term of service for which he enlisted, entitled only to receive the proportion of the bounty allowed by the Act cited, whether one third or two-thirds thereo', which had actually accrued before the date of his discharge.

For instance: If the soldier volunteered for two (2) years, and is mustered out before the expiration of the first

For instance: If the soldier volunteered for two (2) years, and is mustered out before the expiration of the first year of his service, he cannot claim either the second or third instalments of the bounty of two hundred (200) dollars, which would have been payable to him, had he continued in the service till the expiration of the two (2) years for which he enlisted.

Only the volunteer, who, at the time of his discharge has completed one half the term of service for which he enlisted, is entitled to the second installment of one third the amount of bounty given to him by the Act, and he is entitled to no more of that bounty. If he is discharged on the next day after the expiration of one half of his term of enlistment, the second installment of the bounty is due, and rayable to him, but the discharge precludes him from receiving a third installment, that being due only to a volunteer who may have served his entire term of enlistment. III. In discharging men from service, Mustering Offi-cers will note the balances of bounties due on the muster out rolls, opposite the names of the soldiers respectively.

Great care must be exercised in doing this Prior to payment, Paymasters will carefully re-examine the rolls, with

the view of detecting errors in amounts thereon noted.

All parties who commence business after the publication of this agreement, must file an oath of loyalty with the Supervising Special Agent.

VI. In preparing the muster out rolls, Corps, Department, Division and Brigade commanders will hold regimental officers to a strict accountability in order to insure accurate and complete records of the enlisted men, and the better to establish the just claims of the non-commissioned officers and privates who have been wounded, or of the representatives of those who have died from disease or wounds, or been killed in battle.

VII. Prior to the departure of regiments from the rendezvous where mustered out, all public property (except arms, colors and equipage required en route) will be turned over 10, and cared for by, the proper officers of the Supply Departments concerned. GENERAL ORDERS,) ceased; that for us the war is ended, and it is hoped that peace will soon be restored throughout our country.
