

PROCLAMATION  
By the President of the United States of America.

WHEREAS, THE FOURTH SECTION OF THE fourth article of the Constitution of the United States declares that the United States shall guarantee to every State a republican form of government; and whereas it is the duty of the United States to protect each of them against invasion and domestic violence; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States is by the Constitution Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy, and is Chief Executive Officer of the United States, and is bound by solemn oath faithfully to execute the laws of the United States, and to take care that they be faithfully executed; and

WHEREAS, the rebellion, which has been waged by a portion of the people of the United States against the proper constituted authorities of the government thereof in the most violent and revolting form, but whose organized and armed forces have now been almost entirely overcome, and the great majority of the United States, and the State of North Carolina of all civil government; and

WHEREAS, it becomes necessary and proper to carry out and enforce the obligations of the United States to the people of North Carolina in securing them in the enjoyment of a republican form of government;

THE AMNESTY OATH.

The amnesty oath now substitutes the oath and parole heretofore administered to soldiers and civilians. All that opportunely after the words—"So help me God"—is expunged, and the first part of the original oath constitutes the amnesty oath, the parole being added, it is implied in the oath.

The following is the present form of the oath: I, the undersigned, do solemnly swear, in the presence of Almighty God, that I will henceforth faithfully support, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States, and the Union of the States thereunder; and that I will in like manner abide by and faithfully support all acts of Congress passed during the existing rebellion with reference to slaves, so long as such acts do not conflict with the provisions of the said Constitution, and the said Union, and that I will in like manner abide by and faithfully support all proclamations of the President made during the existing rebellion having reference to slaves, so long and so far as not modified or declared void by the decision of the Supreme Court.—So help me God.
