The Indian Bureau in Washington has received Gen. Herron's official despatches furnishing a report of the mission of two officers whom he recently sent to the Indian country to negotiate with the rebel Indians. On their arrival these officers found that a grand council of twenty tribes, which they had hoped to be at the place of meeting in time to attend, had adjourned; but with several of the leading chiefs a temporary treaty of amity between the government and the Indians was entered into, and arrangements made for negotiating a permanent one at a council to be held at Armstrong's Academy, in the Choctaw Nation, on the 1st of next September.

The Prince's barouche, with four bays, is very perfect, the harness not showing too much silver. the liveries dark gr en and orange, with the Russian cockade, which is black, orange and white. The Prince's dark green drag, decked out with orange, which he drives himself, excite; even English admiration. I dare not tell you what he paid for his team, which is matchless. His mines in the Ural Mountains are, as you are aware, almost as productive as Monte Christo's island. At one of the fancy balls of last season the costume his Highness had chosen was remarked on-a plain buff coat being a singular contrast to the glittering dresses of the rest of the company. Have you seen the Prince's cap? was the reply; 'His cap; it's black velvet,' 'And the button?' 'Ah! what is it?' 'The Sancy diamond, worth helf a million.' 'The Duke de Montgomery's sister, Princess de Sagan, with her dark barouche, decked out with

red, attracts attention, from the fact that she drives one grey and one chesnut, perfectly matched, how-ever, and good steppers. The liveries of her hus band's ancient house have been for centuries light blue and red and powder, which is not a sine que non here, as it is in London.

"The Contesses Merce Argenteen's turn-out is English. The Conte drives in his pheeton a pair of grey ponies, from Tarbes, capital goers, but I ven-ture to suggest to M. le Conte the advantage of dearning how to handle the ribbons before endangering our valuable lives by his deviations from the straight line. The Contesse rides better than any other woman in Paris, and dresses well beside. de Lastrade's horses are Norman, and would make respital hutters. We have seen and written of Blondin's best ascensions; but we never saw him when we thought he possessed the nerve, coolness and skill that the emergency demanded of Mr. Leslie yester-day afternoon. The gale on the main land was heavy enough; but as it swept through the gorge it seemed as relentless as the noisy waters beneath which gave it echo, and to cross a slender rope at such a time seemed the veriest fool-hardiness imaginable. But Leslie made his appearance in due time on the American side, was shackled hands and feet, with heavy iron chains, with barely freedom enough allowed him for the use of his balance pole. His handsome wife and pretty child watched the ar rangement of the preliminaries with a genuine anxiety, which was only relieved when he had accomplished his marvellous feat. Leslie's conduct on the rope was eminently graceful, and his acrobatic feats going and coming were as fine as we ever saw. How he kept upon the rope at all is the mystery to us; but he did keep upon it, and, although he was compelled to move cautiously, he made his march back and forth in a manner that we have never seen Blondin equal. It is needless to suggest that at both ends of his cord he was hailed with the most enthusiastic applause; and we think that everybody felt relieved when he concluded his return walk and kissed his wife and baby.

Harry Leslie has proved himself the equal, if not the superior of Blondin, and we hope he will drop the name of the " American Biondin." His repotation as Harry Leslie will be brilliant enough without borrowing a particle of glory from the great. There are in the armies of the Potomac, of the Tennessee, and of Georgia probably Four Thousand of the finest six-mule teams in the world.

Many of them were bought in the beginning of the war,

as young mules, accompanied the armies in all their marenes and camps, and are thoroughly broken, hardened by exercise, gentle and familiar, from being so long surrounded The whole South is stripped of farming stock, and the North also has suffered from the drain of animals, taken to supply the armies.

These animals are sold at public auction ; they will not bring anything like their true value; and such opportunities for farmers to get working animals to stock their farms, and for drovers and dealers in stock to make good speculations, by purchasing them and disposing of them in the South, will never occur again.
