The United States sued for possession of a quantity of cotton which Priclesu, a notorious rebel agent and blockade runner, claimed to have a prior lien upon, inasmuch as he had lost twenty thousand pounds by the rebel government. Vice Chancellor Wood ruled that the United States must take the cotton, but, in doing so, were bound to respect the agreement entered into with regard to this aforesaid cotton by the rebel government, to whom it originally belonged. Prioleau was appointed receiver of the property on his going security to the extent of twenty thousand pounds, and subsequently the cotton was handed over to him by the Liverpool Dock Board.

The rush of emigrants to this country from the North of Europe is setting in with more than usual vehemence. Fifteen thousand Polish exiles are making arrangements with the Swiss government for transportation to the free soil of the States. From Norway the exodus of the most valuable part of the population is so great to excite the fears of the au ities, who are endeavoring to check it.

The Paris correspondent of the London News, usually very well informed, throws out a hint that Napoleon is preparing to take up the Mexican question on his own account as soon as Maximilian returns to Miramar.

No advance had yet taken place in United States five twenties, which were quoted at 691 in London on the 20th ult. California News.
