We gather from Washington and Baltimore pepers of yesterday the following summary of intelli-

THE CONGRESSIONAL OATH. Some of the citizens of Charlottesville, Virginia, recently addressed a letter to President Johnson, appealing to him for council and advice in relation to the Congressional test oath, asking whether it is probable that the oath would be repealed or modified so as to admit members from the Southern States, professing that their main purpose in asking his views on this subject is to pursue that course which will be most likely to sustain him and his policy in the administration of the Government. Attorney General Speed states he is instructed by President Johnson to say that he (the President) "has no means of knowing what Congress may do in regard to the oath about which they inquire, than any other citizen, but it is his earnest wish that loyal and true men, to whom no objection can be made, should be elected to Congress.'

THE TEST OATH IN VIRGINIA. The United States District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia assembled on Tuesday at Alexandria. Francis Smith, a lawyer of Alexandria, who participated in the rebellion, made a speech, in which he contended that, having been pardoned by the President, he was entitled to be admitted to practice at that court without being required to take the test oath as provided for by act of Congress; that the pardon absolved him from all accountability for taking part in the rebellion, and he should be considered in the same light as a person who had been loyal during the war, and should be permitted to practice upon taking the customary oath required from Attorneys. The District Attorney, L. H. Chandler, will answer this argument on Wednes-

ALABAMA CONVENTION.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Sept. 25, 1865. An ordinance declaring the act of secession null and void was unanimously adopted by the Alabama State Convention to-day, after having been debated the entire day.

No vote has yet been taken concerning the subject of the Alabama State debt. It has been referred to a committee, who will report on it in a day

The Convention adopted the ordinance for the abolition of slavery with only three dissenting votes. Everything is going on most satisfactorily for the cause of the Union.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Sept. 26, 1865. The Convention passed to-day the following or-

dinance: Be it ordained, &c., That all the ordinances, resolutions and other proceedings of a convention of the people of the State of Alabama, begun and held on the 7th day of January, 1861, and on the 4th day of March, 1861, together with so much of the constitution adopted by said convention for the State of Alabama as conflicts with the constitution of the United States, are hereby declared null and

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Sept. 28, 1865. The election ordinance was debated all day, and finally agreed to. All State elections are to be left to the people on the 1st Monday of November. The question of appointments and representatives received some discussion, and will be further debated to morrow.

MONTGOMERY, Sept. 29. The Convention to-day passed an ordinance that

TRAINS THROWN FROM THE TRACK. CINCINNATI, Sept. 28.—While Gen. Grant was returning from Indianapolis at an early hour yesterday morning the switch at the end of the curve at Guilford had been turned intentionally, and the cars in which the General was seated was thrown from the track and dragged some distance, but no one was injured.

About the same time the train on the Ohio and Mississippi Railroad, carrying Gen. Sherman, was also thrown from the track this side of Laurenceburg, but no one injured.
