NEW AND IMPORTANT DISCOVERY IN TELEGRAPHING.

LANCASTER, Onio, Oct. 28, 1865. EDS. COM -Some years since Mr. M. L. Mason, a resident of Carroll, in this County, conceived a new plan of transmitting telegraphic dispatches, differing from the present plans of land and ocean telegraphing. This system the discoverer terms "Atmospheric Telegraphing." During the past seven years Mr. Mason has experimented at all seasons of the year, and with such success as to satisfy himself, as well as several scientific men, that by this system messages may be sent from New York to London through the air. By this plan, messages. may also be sent from mid ocean to either shorea thing impossible under the present system of submarine telegraphing.

The discoverer submitted his system to Professor John Williams, (one of the most learned, scientific men in the State, and author of the "Topical Lexicon,") who, after a careful examination, made the following statement:

"I have examined a method proposed by Mr. M. L. Mason for telegraphing, by which submarine ca-bles may be dispensed with, and dispatches may be transmitted through the air between points on opposite sides of wide oceans. The plan is, in the nature of things, pract cable; and I hope that Mr. Mason will meet with such patrorage from the public as will enable him to test his method by an experiment on a large scale.

JOHN WILLIAMS." Mr. Mason has written a small work upon the subject, and has a number of designs, illustrating his system and his observations, and experiments made during the past seven years. He proposes, during the coming year, to present his plan and to exhibit his designs to the leading scientific and commercial men of the principal cities. A. P. M.

THE LATE STEAMBOAT BURNING AT PITTSBURG. William C. Champlin, who confessed to having kindled the fire on the 10th September last, which resulted in the destruction, at the Monongahela wharf, of the steamers River Queen and George Albree, was brought into Court this morning, and plead guilty to an indictment for arson, with intent to defraud in-urance companies.

He was asked if he had any statement to make in his own behalf. He said he had fired the River Queen, of which he was part owner, with a view to her destruction, as a matter of revenge upon her other owners. This was all he said, except that he came from Connecticut, where his family now reside. Judge Sterrett said that while the Court should "temper justice with mercy," he felt that this case called for a severe sentence. It might, however, be one for executive clemency. Champlin was then sentenced to undergo an imprisonment of four years in the Western Penitentiary .- Pitts. burg Gazette.

A BAFFLED REBEL.—George N. Sanders has had a hard time of it in Canada ever since the Confederacy became a "moist unpleasant body." The Canadians are evidently becoming sick of him and his friends, and regard in a ludicrous light his demand for justice against the persons charged with an attempt to kidnap him to the United States .-The second trial has terminated like the first in the disagreement and discharge of the jury. The case, however, was marked by a display of partisan feeling by the Judge which reflects but little credit on Canadian justice. The Judge charged strongly against the prisoners, and kept the jurors locked up for ten days because they were unable to agree to a verdict. The difference arose on the credibility of O'Leary, a principal w tness for the prosecution, who perverted his standing as a Freemason to worm himself into the confidence of the prisoners, and lure them on to the perpetration of the crune, to which the defence insisted our old friend George was a consenting party. At any rate the 'ury could not agree to a verdict, and sullenly held out against the directions of the Judge to convict the prisoners. There is to be a third trial, and this precious ornament of the Canadian Judiciary meanly entered upon the docket a request to his brother Judges to hold the prisoners in custody and re-

These proceedings are far from helping Sanders among the Canadians, who appear to be heartily disgusted with him and his cause. The papers complain that the fugitives continue to keep the Provinces in hot water all the time, and have cost them more than a million of dollars in warlike preparations against the United States, and intimate that their presence is no longer desirable and profitable. George N. Sanders was clearly aware of this plot to abduct him, and the fault of his lifetime is that he indefinitely postponed his chances for pardon by refusing to be conveyed, free of expense, to the genial atmosphere of Washington.

AN OLD STORY .- The worsh spers of Mammon, says a Constantinople correspondent, have discovered that there is another power beside that of gold, and another God who is above the idol of worldly wealth. During the time the cholera lasted, it was pitable to see the fright of all those who used to boast that they had no religion and no creed save that of Nature. The young Turkish school of Moslems, who had many of them thrown off even the semblence of a belief in the Koran, were in a great er fright of death than any men I ever saw. The chriatians were bad enough, at least such among them-not a few-who had led lives not exactly in accordance with their creed. The Armenian, Latin, Greek, and other churches were crowded every day with men and women hearing mass and going to confession, who for months, perhaps years, pre-viously had never put foot inside a sacred edifice. Many of the priests were actually prevented going to administer to the dying, by the importunity of the living for the consulations of religion. Now that all fear of the cholera has passed, every one has returned to his old ways.

The Little Gale on the Lakes. BUFFALO, Nov. 1 .- The Commercial publishes a list of the disasters by the late gale. The following are the most important: The propeller, Her Majesty, sunk at Port Colborne, had 500 barrels of flour on board. Propeller Marquette was sunk in shoal water at Bar Point. The propeller Caldwell lost her shaft, and will have to be docked. The schooner Lucy Auckland, with coal from Cleve-land, lost her deck load. The schooner Cornwall, with 7,000 bushels of corn from Toledo for Oswego is ashore on North Amboy reef, full of water. The schooner E. S. J. Bemes, laden with wheat from Milwaukie, was towed into Cleveland in a sinking condition. The propeller, Mineral Rock, crossed Saginaw bay during the storm Her gangways were burst in by the force of the waves, and her deck load and eighteen head of cattle washed overboard. The sekence allowed washed overboard. board. The schooner Algerine, with a load of barley, is sunk at Port Colborne.
