

A PROCLAMATION.

Aaron V. Brown,
Governor of the State of Tennessee,
To all who shall see these Presents: WHEREAS, It has been made known to me that a certain James Dinning stands charged with having committed a foul and atrocious murder on the 10th day of November 1845, upon the body of William B. Norman, late of our County of Sumner, has fled from justice and is now remaining at large. Now, therefore, I, AARON V. BROWN, Governor as aforesaid, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested, do hereby offer a reward of five hundred dollars (barely reviving all former rewards offered) to any person or persons who may apprehend said James Dinning, and deliver him to the Sheriff or Jailor of our County of Sumner in order that justice in that behalf may be had and executed according to the course of law.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great Seal of the State to be affixed at Nashville, on the 21st day of April 1846.

He is about 25 years of age. His wife is a woman of good countenance, has blue eyes, fair skin, rather dark hair, and a little inclined to be fleshy. She is about 23 years old.
