WESTERN EXTENSION.—The Salisbury Banner speaks as follows of the passage of the Western Extension bill and of those who voted against it. It seems that the Banner does not exactly agree with its contemporary of the Standard, as to the position assumed by Mr. Senator Biggs upon this vexed and (to him) perplexing question. Doctors will differ.

It will be recalled that the passage of this bill in the Senate, in spite of the strenuous opposition, this bill, originated by our townsmen, Mr. Fisher, has been carried triumphantly through the Commons, we doubt not, will confirm this noble act of the Senate. We regret to state that Mr. Biggs, our U. S. Senator, made a violent speech in opposition to the bill, notwithstanding he was the author of a resolution, pledging the Democratic party to the great scheme of internal improvement. Why he should speak and vote against this bill, and at the same time vote for an appropriation to the Cape Fear and Deep River improvement, we are at a loss to know; whereas, the first would give interest and energy to the Western part of our State, but would also be a current through which Western produce could seek North Carolina market, and the Cape Fear and Deep River improvement is only sectional.

It is not to be supposed that Mr. Biggs is an unpatriotic and selfish man, but we are very far from being so. We had thought that every body who had thought—including Mr. Biggs, that the Western Extension bill, was regarded as a great State measure; but in this, it seems, we have been mistaken, much to the sorrow of Western North Carolina. But we rejoice to know that there are in the Senate many—very many—high minded, noble hearted men, that are untrammelled by the corruptions of party and who have proper respect to the people. Through North-Carolina, we have many party spirit; laying all sectional feelings upon the common altar of our country, and are striving with a laudable emulation to work for the good of the State. These men will be remembered. When the warm breath of the West, shall have melted away the frost from the mountains, and the sunbeams of the East, shall have melted away the snow from the West, when the Western Extension bill is passed—no doubt it will be—the hardy mountaineer shall mingle congratulations with the men of the East, and all shall unite in praise at the success of our country; the scales no doubt will fall from the eyes of the South, and they will be State of such glorious prospects, they will be seen clambering over the other side of the line, from which they now stand. They will regret of their past course and swear that they have always been North Carolina's truest friends.

IMMIGRATION FOR JANUARY.—The number of immigrants who arrived at New York, during the week ending on Wednesday, was but 1,764, making a total for January of 1,622. The arrivals for the week periods in 1854 were 4,282 for the week, and 15,511 for the month. The falling off for the month has been nearly one hundred per cent. in 1855 as compared with 1854; and the immigration for January, 1855, was very small in comparison with the ensuing months of the year; and when, remarks the New York Courier, it is remembered that late advices from Europe state, that there are but few steamer passengers offering, it will be perceived that there is good ground to anticipate that—unless something should happen which is not now expected—the immigration for 1855 will be much lower in number than for many years past.

U. S. TREASURY.—By a statement from the Treasury department, it appears that the net amount in the different depositories, subject to the draft of the United States Treasury, on the 23rd of January, 1855, was \$21,047,123.29; of which sum there was in the depository at Washington, \$40,199.13; Boston, \$3,543,523.95; New York, \$1,692,215.91; New Orleans, \$855,806.02; St. Louis, \$4,350,095.52; Baltimore, \$23,029.30; Richmond, \$13,640.00; Norfolk, \$228,097.23; Wilmington, N. C. \$17,415.47; Cincinnati, Ohio, \$25,079.41; and at Philadelphia Mint, \$2,055,000. Among the transfers ordered, was one from New York of \$1,314,000; one from St. Louis of \$11,880,000; and one from Philadelphia Mint of \$215,000.

ANOTHER PROVERB.—The Niagara minister has addressed another letter to Secretary Meyer, protesting against the Kinney expedition. In this letter the minister forcibly demonstrates that the United States has always asserted the right of Niagara to that coast, and cannot now consistently, he alleges, suffer it to be invaded by an enterprise like the one under Col. Kinney.

THE CINCINNATI (OHIO) COMMERCIAL says that a letter was received by a medical gentleman of that city, late, from Dr. Rooster, of Lancaster, Ohio, one of the oldest and most efficient of the profession in the State, containing information of the birth, in that place, of a pair of human twins, connected by bonds somewhat resembling that of the celebrated Siamese Twins. At the latest advices the little prodigy was living, but was thought too feeble to survive.

THE PRESIDENT has dismissed Lieut. "Alvarado" Hunter from the Naval service of the United States. His offense against the rules of the service was in recently bringing his ship (the Bainbridge) home from her station in the Brazil coast squadron, as explained heretofore.

WE learn from the Salisbury papers, that the Trustees of Davidson College have elected the Rev. Dr. Lay, of this city, President of that Institution. Dr. Lay, is a ripe scholar, and we doubt not would do much towards building up that institution. We have not named whether Dr. L. has accepted or not.

BALLOON ASCENTS.—Prof. Elliott advertises that he has made his 13th ascent from Salem, on the 15th inst.
