He regarded the nation I domain in the light of a recommon fund," to be managed and dispused of for the recommon benefit of all the States." This properbenefit of all the States." This proper-ty, he thought, should be prudently and providently administered—that it should not be wantonly sacrificed at inadequate prices, and that it should not be unjustive abandoned, in violation of the trust under which it was held, to a favored section of the country.
