One Hundred Dollars Reward.

The undersigned will give the above reward for the apprehension of his negro slave WILSON.

Wilson runs away from my service about the 20th day of August last.

Wilson is about six feet 10 inches in height - is stoutly made, and weighs from 150 to 160 pounds.

He has a dark complexion, has a rather square face, and is without any remarkable features.

He is a native of the State of Virginia, and is a member of the Methodist Church.

He is a very industrious and obedient man, and is well acquainted with the English language.

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Proclamation.—By the Governor of North Carolina.

Whereas, it has been officially reported to this Department, that on or about the 10th February a negro boy, the property of Col. Luke Russell, of Graham county, was supposed to have been kidnapped by John and Samuel Smith, which boy was discovered, ten or twelve days afterwards, near the road side in Green county, and partially buried - a half having been shot through his head, and his throat cut from ear to ear and as the said John and Samuel Smith stand charged with the felony aforesaid.

Now, therefore, to the end, that the said offenders may be apprehended and brought to trial, I do hereby require all officers, whether civil or military, within this State, to use their best exertions to apprehend or cause to be apprehended, the said fugitives.

Given under my hand as Governor, and the Great Seal of the State of North Carolina, at Raleigh, this 26th day of March, 1840.

The courses, which occupy two years, will be a general expansion of the studies for the degree of A. B.
