We hold these truths to be self evident; that all men are created free and equal; they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, and the pursuit of happiness.—That to secure these rights, certain moral and physical laws are established among men, designed for their best good; that whenever any habit or appetite becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of those concerned to alter or abolish it, and to establish habits, laying their foundation on such principles as shall be most likely to effect their safety and happiness.
