

FORM OF A CONTRACT BETWEEN A PLASTER AND OVERSEER.

Articles of Agreement made and entered into this day of 1849, between A. B. of the first part, and C. D. of the second part: Witnesseth, that the said A. B. agrees to live in the capacity of an overseer, on the plantation of the said C. D. for the sum of dollars per month, payable on the first day of January, 1850.

For the full and perfect performance of each and every stipulation we bind ourselves in the sum of Given under our hands and seals this day and date above written.

REMARKS.—The above form of agreement between a planter and overseer, is concise. The subject is a matter of general interest. Plots of fields, the quantity of land in each, its crops, rotation, &c., should be made. Indeed, much is gained by keeping an accurate account of all disbursements, receipts, and the cost of crops in labor and money.
