WAKE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.—The meeting of the Board of County Commissioners which commenced its session on yesterday was the closing one of the fiscal year, and therefore much business was transacted. The different county officers tendered their official bonds in the following amounts: J. J. Nowell, Sheriff, \$105,000. John B. Neathery, Treasurer, \$80,000. Charles D. Upchurch, Clerk of the Superior Court, \$10,000. W. W. White, Register of Deeds, \$5,000. Wm. R. Richardson, Coroner, \$2,000. The pressure of business prevented the formal acceptance of the bonds on yesterday but they were no doubt received to day.

The main feature of the meeting was the reading of the report of Col. John B. Neathery, County Treasurer, before the Magistrates and Board of Commissioners. We have reason to believe that this important document will be published for the information of the people. It is a clear and able statement of the condition of the monetary affairs of the county, and reflects great credit upon Col. Neathery's administration as Treasurer. W. R. Poole, Esq., the present efficient chairman of the board, was re-elected for the coming fiscal year.
