PARTIES.

At a notice that several of the Radical papers of this and other States are, or profess to be, jubilant over the Virginia elections. They claim that the result shows that the Democratic party is dead, at least in that State. We think they are more than half right—we are of the same opinion ourselves. It shows much more than that—it shows that Radicalism is quite as dead as Democracy.

TOO LATE. The Living Present wishes, "for the good of every body concerned," that the same policy which marked the Virginia campaign in the late campaign had been the policy of North Carolina in 1868. In that event it thinks that Governor Holden would now be "editor and proprietor of the Standard, cursing the administration probably while the miserable adventurers, who have cursed us more terribly than did the Goths and Vandals the civilized nations of Southern Europe, after the decline of Rome, would long ago have sought some more favorable climate for their activities, their cheats and their robberies."

PARTIES IN VIRGINIA. Never has any election in this country perplexed the politicians more than those recently held in Virginia. The Northern Democracy were anxious to claim the result as a Democratic victory, but in this it was rebuffed by every Conservative journal in Virginia, and justly so. On the other hand many radical journals claim it as a triumph of their principles with quite as little, if not less, show of reason. It may possibly, in the end, prove to have been the triumph of a renovated and reconstructed republicanism while it consoled the death-knell both of Nationalism and Democracy. This, however, depends much upon the course to be taken by Gen. Grant. Never did any president possess so fine an opportunity to immortalize his name by becoming the pacifier of his country, and we hope he may yet prove himself equal to the occasion.

SUPREME COURT. Rules of Practice in the Supreme Court of North Carolina, adopted at the June Term, 1869. I. Appeals will be docketed for their proper consideration in the order in which the papers are filed with the Clerk. II. The Clerk will docket no appeal in a civil action, unless it appears that the appellant has filed in the Court below, an undertaking payable to the appellee, with sufficient surety, and in a sufficient amount to cover the costs of all cases which may be adjudged against him in the Court; or has made a deposit in lieu of such undertaking; or unless, by leave of this Court, he shall file such an undertaking, or make such deposit with the Clerk here. This rule shall apply, notwithstanding an appeal bond shall be waived by the appellee.
