## LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

SENATE.  
Wednesday, Nov. 29, 1870.

The Senate met at 10 o'clock.  
Mr. Love from the committee on Propri-  
ations and Grievances, recommended  
the passage of a bill in relation to the  
keeper of the Capitol.

Mr. Smith introduced a bill to consoli-  
date the North Carolina Railroad Com-  
pany and the North Western N. C. R. R.  
Company. Referred to the committee on  
Internal Improvements.

Mr. Love introduced a bill to repeal cer-  
tain sections and amend others in chap-  
ter 270, acts of 1868-69. Referred to  
Judiciary Committee.

Also a bill to repeal certain parts of  
chapter 170, acts of '68-'69. Referred  
to committee on Judiciary.

Mr. Clark introduced a resolution to  
repeal certain parts of the Code of 1868.

Mr. Brogden introduced a resolution  
abolishing the "gag-law," known as the  
previous question.

Mr. Love introduced a resolution abo-  
lishing the present regulations in regard  
to pages.

Mr. Price moved to amend. The  
amendment was lost, and resolution adopted.

The bill to abolish the office of State  
Printer and for other purposes, the other  
purposes being the authorizing a joint com-  
mittee to make such arrangements as they  
think proper, was taken up.

Mr. King hoped the Senate would adopt  
the House bill, and give the printing to the  
lowest bidder.

Mr. Graham thought that played out in  
1844, when a man took the job and then  
run away. The bill passed, yeas 35 nays 6.

Mr. Currie from the committee on En-  
grossed bills reported a bill to provide for  
a special term of the Superior Court in  
Davidson, and Senate resolution in favor  
of the Sheriff of Northampton and Wilkes  
counties, correctly engrossed.

Mr. Cowles from the committee on Fi-  
nance reported the bill increasing the sal-  
ary of the Attorney General, and recom-  
mended that the bill do not pass.

The bill was placed on the calendar.  
The bill in relation to the keeper of the  
of the Capitol was taken up, read a second  
time and passed.

Mr. Graham proposed several verbal  
amendments which were adopted.

Mr. Price moved to amend by inserting  
the name of Senator Lehman after that of  
Mr. Allen. Amendment lost, yeas 12 nays  
23.

The hour of 12 having arrived the Senate  
adjourned to the hall of the House to  
hear the announcement with reference to  
the election of U. S. States Senator.

Zetula B Vance was declared duly  
elected and the Senate returned to its own  
hall.

Mr. Norment moved to amend by adding  
two other names to the commission.  
The amendment was lost. Yeas 13,  
nays 25.

The bill passed its second reading. The  
rules were suspended and bill passed—  
yeas 20 nays 7.  
Bill to abolish the office of keeper of  
the Capitol was taken up. The rules sus-  
pended and the bill put upon its passage.  
Mr. Robbins of Rowan, moved to amend  
by inserting the words "and General As-  
sembly" in place of "Senate."  
The bill and amendment was referred  
to the Judiciary Committee.

Senate adjourned till 10 o'clock to-mor-  
row.
