SYNOPSIS OF THE CONVENTION BILL.

The Raleigh Sentinel gives the following summary of the Convention Bill as it finally passed both Houses of the General Assembly:

FADHERBERG'S BILL.—THE BEST THING OF THE WAR.

A letter to Harry in the New York Herald, dated 9 Inst., says—

A gentleman from Rome, who arrived here to day, tells a very charming story of the engagement in front of Arax the other day between Faillerbergs army and the Prussians under Manteuffel. He said: it has been thought throughout the whole Prussian army that the Mantes were but well aware of this current report. Faillerberg took advantage of the reputation of his Mantes on the second day of the fight in this wise: He caused the fat, bold, and all the expected flesh of the Mantes to be painted black, and the Mantes to be dressed as Turcos. The regular soldiers of the march, on the contrary were disguised as Mantes, and the General, after putting this *finesse* upon his command, formed his line of battle with the Mantes *vertibiles* in the front, with the best and regular soldiers in reserve to support the exigencies of any emergency.

The battle proceeded, the Prussians alwa-s seeking the Mantes, met the troops of the march disguised as such, finding a warm reception, and carefully avoiding the spurious Mantes disguised as Turcos, who are very inhospitable to the invaders. The consequence was that the efficiency of the army was greatly augmented—the force appeared appealing to the enemy, and a more clever use was employed than that known of the false houses in the famous siege of Troy."
