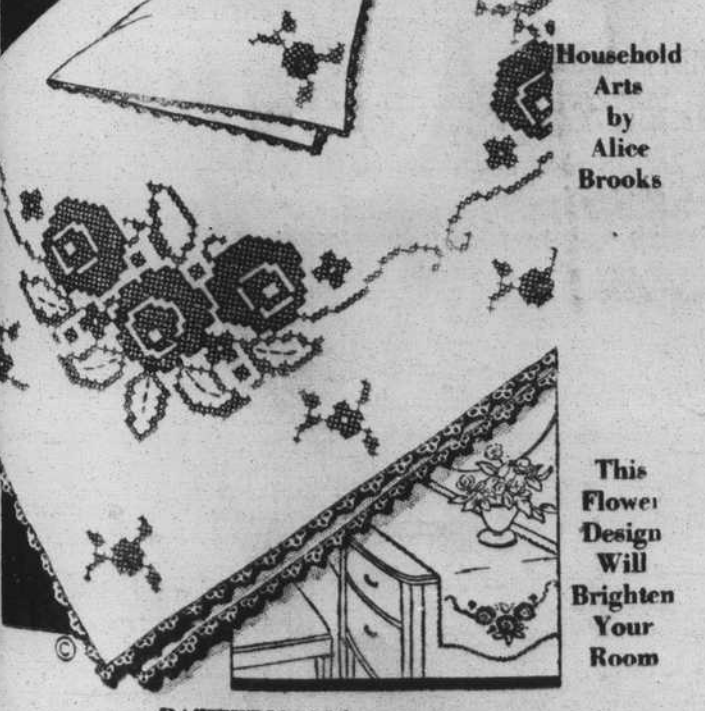
**MCFARLAND WEDS HEFFNER**
