

## Rose Bowl Choice Dwindles To Five Undefeated Teams

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Giving the football expert one break for all the weekly headaches he's been suffering, this dizzy campaign appears considerably less complicated than usual in the matter of weeding out the Rose and Sugar Bowl hopefuls on the grid-iron front.

Ordinarily, a considerable number of possibilities would still be rated well up front in the running. This year, however, while several are yet in the fight, the surprise packages unloaded week after week have been cutting the candidates off in droves.

At the moment, five favorites appear in the "highly regarded" class of the rapidly dwindling group. And to three of these five, the coming Saturday's program mean the make or break point for their ambitions. Two of them—Tulane and Alabama, each unbeaten, but once tied—meet in a decisive battle to postseason hopes.

A third member of the quintet, Fordham's sturdily defensive Rams, take on the "touchdown crazy" Bollermakers of Purdue.

The other two leading candidates for one or another of the "Bowl" nominations, Marquette's undefeated, untied golden avalanche, Louisiana State's once-tied Tigers, take on Creighton and Mississippi State, respectively, neither of whom should cause any trouble. This list disregards Northwestern's mighty Wildcats, whose big ten connections forbid postseason competition.

## LARGE NUMBER GRADUATES OF JUNE NOW EMPLOYED

CHAPEL HILL, Nov. 4.—A large majority of the University of North Carolina's 369 graduates last June are now employed, according to statistics released today by I. G. Griffin, Director of the Vocational Information Bureau here.

One hundred and sixty seven, or 46 percent of the students, reported they are gainfully employed; 65 are pursuing further study here and elsewhere, and only 28 are unemployed.

A total of 60 have not been heard from. Three graduates, who are married, reported themselves as "employed."

## NATIONAL HORSE SHOW OPENS FOR SOCIETY PARADE

### Many Thousands Will Attend Annual Contests

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The National Horse show, signaling the beginning of the winter sports and social seasons, opens its seven-day stay in Madison Square Garden tonight with a record entry list.

A total of 537 show horses, from tiny harness ponies to the rangy jumpers, are slated to compete while the individual entry total is well over 2,000. Horses and riders come from all parts of the United States and six foreign countries, which have entered teams in the colorful and exciting military jumping contests.

In the boxes and arena seats there will be staged nightly another show, almost as colorful as that in the ring. It's society's annual turnout to pay tribute to King Horse and it brings forth the latest and most fashionable costumes and glittering jewels.

Among the blue blooded horses and expert riders who are slated to defend the laurels they won last year are Ireland's military jumping team, King of the Plain, unbeaten champion harness pony owned by Frances Dodge of Rochester, Mich., Gold Digger, champion five-gaited saddle horse from the stable of Louis Kaiser of Bethel, Conn.; Judy King's Knight Bachelor, from Atlanta, champion harness horse; and Miss Dodge's Etta Kett, best three-gaited saddle horse under 15.2 hands.
