Annual Report Is Heard By Body

ALBEMARLE, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The North Carolina conference of the Methodist Protestant conference this morning received the annual report on High Point College and the Children's Home.

Dr. G. I. Humphreys, president of High Point College, presided at the session, at which Dr. A. G. Dixon, superintendent of the Children's Home, told the delegates of progress made in the educational field.

The entire afternoon session was given over to general conference agents. Addresses were made by representatives of the Westminster Theological Seminary and by representatives of publishing agents.

The conference yesterday decided to vote tomorrow morning on the proposal that the church unite with northern and southern Methodist Episcopalians. The plan already has the approval of the general conference.

Plans call for a secret ballot on the proposal, rather than a roll call vote.

The proposal will be presented formally by Dr. James H. Straughn of Baltimore, president of the general conference, which met last May at High Point.

Chrysler Gives Bonus To Help

DETROIT, Nov. 6.—(AP)—K. T. Keller, president of the Chrysler corporation, announced today that the automobile manufacturing firm will distribute a \$4,000,000 bonus among 67,000 employees the week of Dec. 14.

It will be the third distribution of extra compensation the concern has made to employees this year. Their total, Keller said, will be \$8,300,000 in excess of regular wages. Of the workers who will share in the latest bonus, 59,000 are in Michigan.

By the end of 1936 each employee sharing in the distributions will have received between \$105 and \$155 in extra compensations.

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7 Of 10 Convicts Still At Large

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Seven of 10 convicts who escaped from Kilby prison last night by capturing a power house engineer and cutting the reservation lights still were at liberty today.

Robert Wenz, charged as one of the ringleaders in the outbreak, was recaptured at a Western railway shop several miles from the penitentiary, four hours later.

Early today Richard Dunn and Harold Koerner surrendered without resistance in a residential section of Montgomery.

Hamp Draper, chief of the state convict department, described the break as one of the smoothest executed plans in many years. Not a shot was fired as the 10 climbed the prison wall in the darkness with the aid of a wooden ladder.

Guards stationed on each corner of the wall said they were unable to see or hear the men.

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Boy Dies As Gun Fired By Brother

RALEIGH, Nov. 6.—(AP)—A single-barreled shotgun which H. W. Sanderford, unemployed man living on a farm five miles from here bought for 50 cents to keep thieves from a peacan grove on the farm, resulted in the death this morning of Sanderford's five-year-old son, Russell, when he was accidentally shot by his eight-year-old brother, Richard.

The father was in Raleigh seeking a job at the time and the mother of the youths was at work in a WPA sewing room as the children played at home.

Coroner L. M. Waring said the killing was plainly accidental.

Quintuplets Born In State All Die

DURHAM, Nov. 6.—Quintuplets were born to a 20 year old white woman here but Duke Hospital physicians said the five, four months premature, were dead at birth.

Hospital attendants declined to reveal the identity of the mother, but they said she was a resident of "a nearby town."

Duke Hospital doctors said the event "was quite interesting to us" because quintuplets occur only once in 50,000,000 labor cases.

An attending physician said it was difficult to determine sex of the babies.

ed out to join the fighting, advancing shoulder-to-shoulder with their menfolk in a "human wall" against the onslaught of Fascist insurgents and fierce-fighting Moorish hordes storming at the gates of the capital.

Women Fight

By the hundreds, clutching up rifles, comely young women and hard-muscled housewives answered the government's desperate appeal for new strength to hurl into the battle.

They marched grimly towards the rumble of guns blazing within a few miles of the heart of the city.

Feverishly, the authorities exhorted all able-bodied persons to organize for the defense. They described the feminine combat reinforcement and the enrollments of workmen as "the only way" to save Madrid.

With the bloody battle for Madrid entering its third day—the 112th day of the revolution—war-weary and hungry government militia still held their ground along a 15-mile front encroaching on the capital's suburbs.

The British charge d'affaires, Maurice Ogilvie Forbes, visited the bomb-torn village of Leganes a few hours before the village, seven miles from Madrid, was evacuated.

He was deeply distressed by the slaughter of peasants, their womenfolk and children.

Street cars brought in an ebbing stream of refugees again today from the suburbs—pathetic human cargoes whose rolled-up mattresses jammed the front and rear platforms of the vehicles.

The government today ordered more speed in the construction of trenches and cement "pill boxes" just across the Manzanares river.

Zig-zag earthworks were being thrown up across Comillas field.
