The process server shouldered his way into the plane, posing as a passenger. He approached the Canadian doctor, and after the latter identified himself the subpoena was served. In the resulting confusion,

the process server disappeared and his name was not obtained. A moment later the plane took off for New York, where it was scheduled to arrive at 4:55 p.m. (EST).



## **Baptist Convention Goes** Into Financial Matters
