While a typical November-in-London rain beat down on the deserted street and its lone "bobby" on guard, the American divorcee entertained the monarch and his intimates until it was time to depart for Portland, after midnight.

The king went to "No. 16" after attending Armistice day services in Albert Hall.

WILL TAKE NOL PROS IN MOORESVILLE CASE

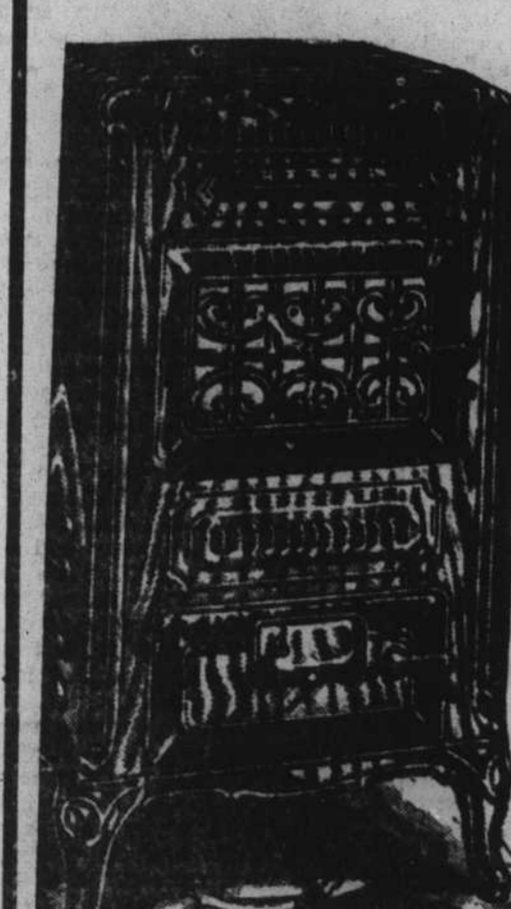

Roughage Is Best Kind Of Cow Feed

Good roughage is the cheapest milk-producing feed a farmer can give his cows, said John A. Arey, extension dairy specialist at State College.

Roughage is not only inexpensive and nutritious, he pointed out, but it also tones up the digestive tract and keeps cattle in good health. A cow can eat enough roughage to obtain more than half the nutrients she needs for her highest

milk yield. To get the best results, Arey phasized, only high quality roughage should be fed, and the cow must become accustomed to large quantities of it.
