#### Government Units | Gets Six Months Will Be Changed TVA Head States

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 .- (A) Arthur E. Morgan, chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority, told American mayors today that in the future "sharp lines between city county and state will disappear, and government will become more regional, in character."

"In addition to geographical units of government, such as cities and counties," he said, "we shall have numerous kinds of functional governments, such as water supply districts, power distribution tricts, recreation and park districts and consolidated school districts."

"Our nation is becoming a living organism, rather than an aggregation of separate institutions, such as cities, counties and states, and such as government and business." Morgan declared. "We are discoving that we cannot well continue to in No. 3 township. divide up our affairs into such simple and distinct units.

"Our industries, especially the utilities, exercise some of the functions of government. Government cannot be kept out of business according to any simple formula. Cities find some of their traditional work slipping out of their hands, while other new duties are coming to them. Counties tend to become obsolete units. Even state bounda ries may be impediments to pro-

Morgan said that "little by little the natural demands of organic growth must be recognized in our statutes and our written constitutions, or our normal growth will be halted and distorted.


