Just Ten Years Ago

Sometime back the local Kiwanis club decided to sponsor a night school. Eight members of the city school faculty were employed under city school direction and now the school is functioning.

Men and women, some of them over 40 years of age, who never had the opportunity for schooling in their youths are now grasping the chance that comes late years. They now realize the value of an education and are getting it to smooth over the remaining years. School officials say that far 115 people are enrolled in the school. Three of these are in the first grade, 18 in the third and fourth, 13 in the fifth, 38 in the sixth and seven, 19 in the high school department and 27 in the

home economics classes.

- Avacado Pear Salad

- Popovers (Nine)**
2 cups flour 1 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt 3 eggs, beaten
- Mix ingredients and beat 2 minutes. Half fill greased hot baking dishes or iron gem pans and bake 30 minutes in hot oven. Lower fire and cook 10 minutes. Serve hot. Popovers are done when they really "pop" out of the pans.
- Candied Sweet Potatoes**
6 boiled potatoes 1 tablespoon fat
4 tablespoons lemon juice
1-2 cup water
2-3 cup brown sugar 1-2 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon paprika
1-4 teaspoon cinnamon
- Peel potatoes, and cut in lengthwise slices. Melt fat in frying pan, add sugar and cook until blended. Add rest of ingredients, bake or cook slowly on top stove 30 minutes. Turn potatoes frequently.
- Bettina Salad Dressing**
Clove garlic 1-4 teaspoon
1 teaspoon salt celery seed
1 teaspoon sugar 5 tablespoons mustard
1-4 teaspoon dry olive oil
1-4 teaspoon 2 tablespoons paprika
lemon juice.
- Rub garlic on insides of small bowl, then discard garlic. Add dry ingredients to bowl and add slowly 2 tablespoons oil, alternate remaining oil with lemon juice and beat 2 minutes with fork. Chill. When ready to serve beat well and pour over salad.

Rev. B. M. Williams Is Not Moving To County

Rev. H. F. Fogleman and family are moving today from Fallston to Efland where Mr. Fogleman has been assigned a charge in Orange county by the M. P. conference, after serving three years in the Fallston charge.

The Fallston charge embraces five churches, Friendship, Laurel Hill, Knob Creek, Hebron and Macedonia. During Mr. Fogleman's term a new building was erected at Friendship and improvements made to other churches.

Mr. Fogleman is held in highest esteem by the people of all denominations in the communities where he served as pastor. He is broad minded and ambitious in Kingdom work. The charge in Orange county is considered one of the best rural charges in the third M. P. district and carries a salary increase.

Prior to his leaving Fallston where he and his family made their home, the Christian Endeavor of Friendship presented him with a handsome blanket, the mission societies of the various churches gave him a shower and the Fallston people a poultice.

Rev. B. M. Williams who was assigned to the Fallston charge by the recent conference convention at Albemarle will not move to the county. He has served a charge near Mebane for 12 years and because of his advanced age and the long distance involved in moving, it is understood that he will not come. His successor has not been named by the conference.
