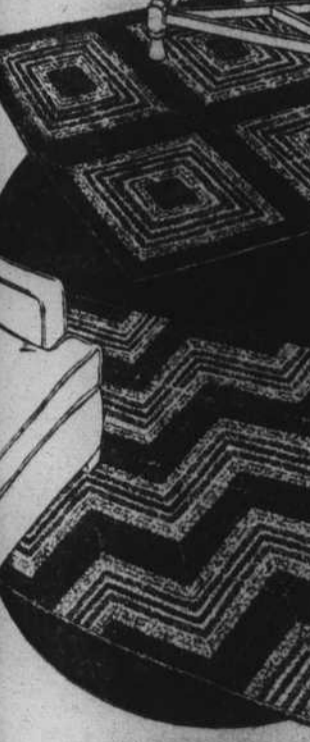

Zon Anthony of Lincoln county visited his sister, Mrs. Margaret Anthony and Mrs. A. L. Howell on last Sunday afternoon.

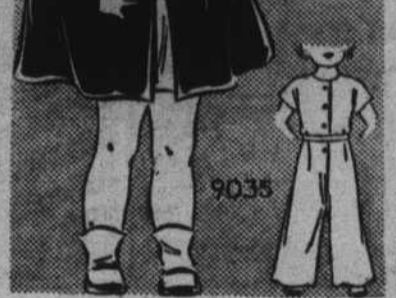
