A negligible amount of work was necessary for recorder's court this morning following the holiday.

Jasper Lookado, Ora mill wouth past two shooting her third husband, Furman E. Godwin, a well-to-do farmer.

Mrs. Godwin, an attractive brunette, was permitted to go free on \$5,000 bond pending the appeal. She wept silently as Judge E. H. Cramer of the state prison.

The defendant's pretty 16-year-old daughter by a previous marriage, Horense Jackson, sobbed while she patted her mother's shoulder.

The jury deliberated 50 minutes before bringing in a verdict of second degre murder, Judge Crammer first sentenced Mrs. Godwin to 15 to 20 years, but reduced the sen-tence after the defense pleaded for

Mrs. Godwin contended she shot her husband in self-defense. The state charged she killed him and then deliberately inflicted three superficial bullet wounds on her body to build up a case of self-de-

The defense sought to show that Mrs. Godwin was shot three times before she returned the fire. Solicitor Claude Canaday did not press for a first degree verdict.
