## NOVEMBER AUTO SALES SHOWS AN INCREASE

RALEIGH, Dec. 4.—(AP)—November's new automobile sales in North Carolina topped those of October, the motor vehicle bureau reported today, but fell under those of 1935.

There were 4,098 new cars and 655 new trucks sold last month, compared with 3,256 cars and 1,098 trucks in October and 4,596 automobiles and 893 trucks in November 1935.

Sales of new automobiles for 11 months this year ran 7,194 under the same period of last year, with 43,528 this year and 50,710 last.
