## 12,407,000 Bales Cotton Estimate

### FORECAST TODAY ONLY 7,000 OVER OCTOBER REPORT

Acre Yield Given As Only 197.6 Pounds

### WAS EXPECTED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 .- (AP)cotton production this year was estimated today at 12,407,000 equivaent 500-pound bales by the department of agriculture in its December

A month ago 1,400,000 bales were forecast. Last year's production was 10.638,000 bales and the average for the five years, 1928-32, was 14,667,000

Acre-yield this year is placed at 197.6 pounds, compared with 199.7 forecast a month ago, 186.3 produced last year, and 169.9, the 1928-32

The acreage for harvest this year was 30,054,000 ,and the abandonment after July 1 was 2.8 per cent of the 30,932,000 acres in cultivation July 1. The acreage picked last year was 27,335,000 and that in cultivation July 1 was 27,888,000, while two years ago it was 26,866,000 and 27,-

Cotton of this year's crop ginned prior to December 1 was reported by the census bureau to have totaled 11,494,170 running bales, compared with 9,356,921 for 1935 and 9,019,834 for 1934.

### WALLIE SPEAKS

By FRANK H. KING LONDON, Dec. 8.—(P)—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin reach-ed Fort Belvedere this evening -summoned by his king-pre-sumably to receive the final de-cision of Edward VIII on re-nounciation of either his throne or Wallis Warfield Simpson.

The premier hastened over the icy roads from London in an hour and 15 minutes to enter the gates of the royal lodge in the gathering darkness, while suspense hung heavy over Lon-don, England and the empire.
