There are from 30 to 35 magistrates in the county who try large number of cases annually Their fees are 50 cents for drawing a warrant, \$1.50 for trying case with 25 cents witness fees. Average costs in a J. P. court are about \$4.50 and in Recorder's cou \$12 to \$14. The county gener fund gets fees and the school fun gets fines from both courts.
