Model Plan Needed

It is likely, though, observers agree, that out of the agitation will come something of permanent good. Either reforms will be shown to be needed and will be made, or the system will be vindicated in such a way as to serve as a proper model for other states. Such a workable model is needed before desired uniformity among the states can be attained.

Accounts of paroled convicts arrested in connection with other crimes or for technical parole violation, and pointed criticism of the system, its administration, and the personnel of the parole board, have led to numerous conferences, hearings, and investigations, out of which have come a number of concrete suggestions.

Proposals Legislation proposed, or already prepared for submission, includes measures which would have one or more of the following effects:


