Molten Lava From Volcano Flows Over Wrecked City

FEAR EPIDEMIC

By The Associated Press SAN SALVADOR, Salvador, Dec. 21.—Officials expressed fears today of a mounting death toll in the devastating earthquake which razed almost all San Vicente and killed at

least 200 persons over the week-end. Persons arriving in San Salvador from the stricken provincial capital told stories of wholesale ruin, of shattered buildings and homes, and of rescuers digging out some 200 bodies in the first few hours after the quake.

Rus's Relief How high the deaths would reach no one would estimate, but government officials dispatched all relief available to the area.

Accurate reports were made increasingly difficult to obtain because of the disrupted communica-tions between the quake area and San Salvador,
