Stuck Whistle Causes Confusion

KANSAS CITY, April 3.—(AP)—The engineer of Missouri-Kansas-Texas freight locomotive No. 887 pulled the whistle for a crossing in southern Kansas Sunday night, it stuck and the train screamed its way for 75 miles across country, leaving a trail of confused citizenry who hopefully thought the war was ended. When the belching engine pulled into Kansas City and into the muffling walls of a roundhouse at 1 o'clock last night numerous telephone calls already had preceded it. Yardmaster John Rittenhouse himself had just begun to inquire about the reports when the locomotive thundered past, still screaming. Trainers said the whistle could be heard for 15 miles and estimated 2,250 square miles were covered with confusion.

Arthur L. Forbes, 60, Dies At River Bend

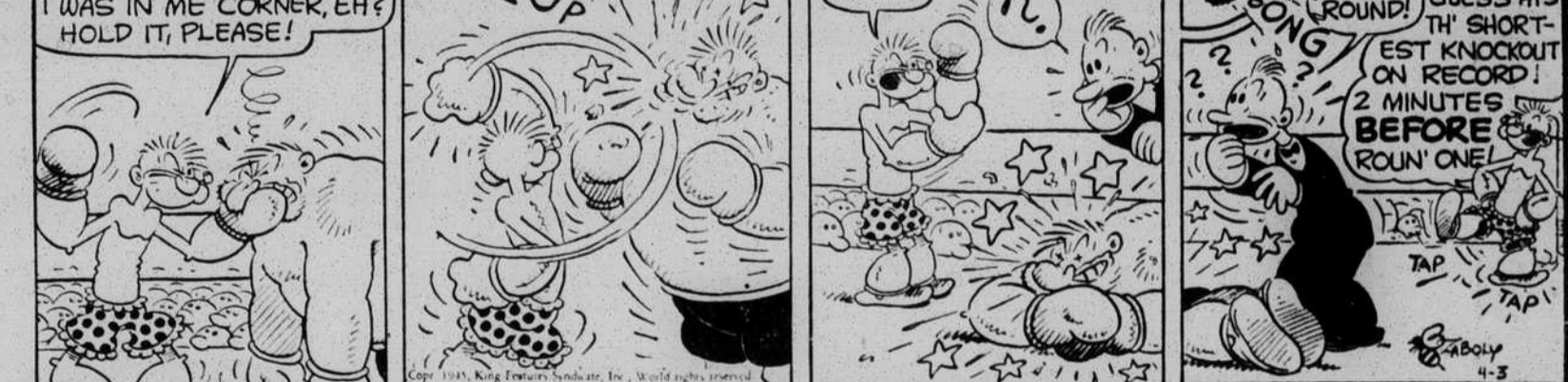

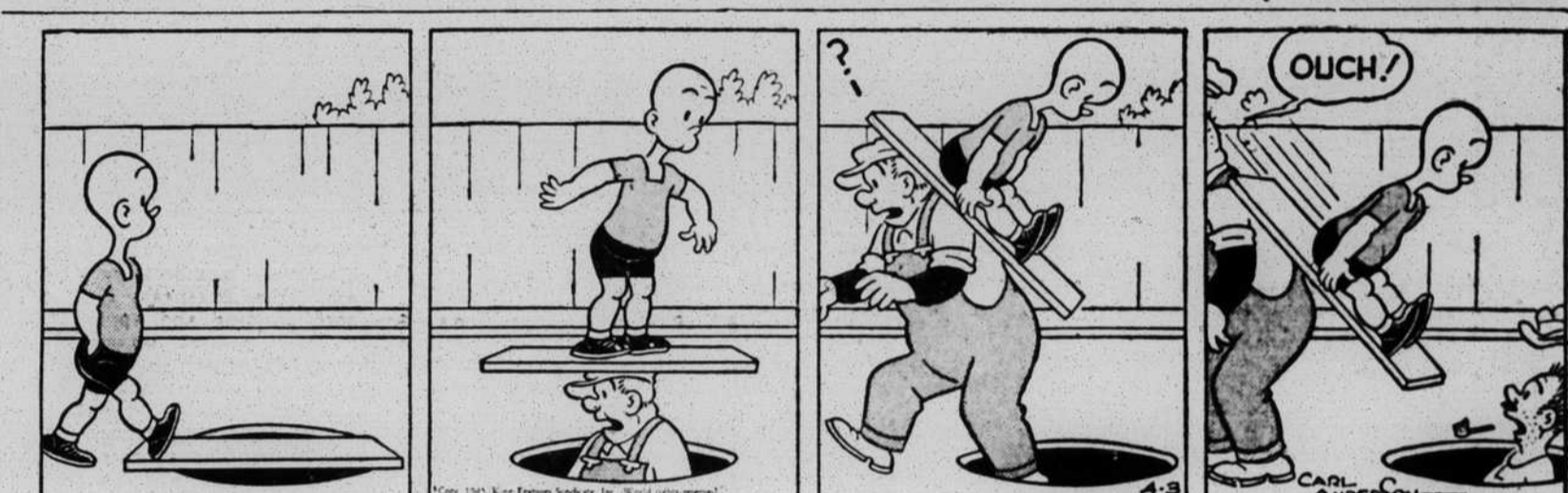
