BRITISH TAKE THREE TOWNS IN DRIVE IN ITALY

Encirclement Of Vienna UNITS GAIN AT Completed; Other Soviet Forces Invade Moravia

LONDON, April 11.—(AP)—Russian forces completed the encirclement of Vienna and with tommy-guns and grenades compressed the doomed Nazi garrison into the eastern onetenth of the tottering Austrian capital, front dispatches to the Moscow press announced today.

These accounts also said that the right wing of Marshal Rodion Malinovsky's second Ukrainian army had invaded the central Czechoslovak province of Moravia at points less than 35 miles from the great city of Bruenn (Brno).

Essen Captured; Allies At Gates Of Brunswick

By JAMES M. LONG

PARIS, April 11.—(P)—The Ninth Army advanced to a point less than 100 miles from Berlin today, captured Essen -largest city in the Ruhr-and crashed into the aircraft center of Brunswick on the high road to the German capital.

The swift moving First Army sped across the Thuringian plain south of the Harz mountains to an unspecified point 120 miles from the Russian lines in a supreme effort to cut Germany in two and bar access to the Alpine redoubts from the north.

Essen, a blackened ruin in which 659,174 persons lived before Hitler loosed his armies, is the home of the sprawling Krupp munitions and iron works. It is the birthplace of Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering and was the sixth largest city in Germany.

'The Ninth Army should reach the Elbe river shortly.' AP Correspondent Robert Eunson reported from that front. The Elbe flows within 50 miles of Berlin and is the last water barrier before the capital.
