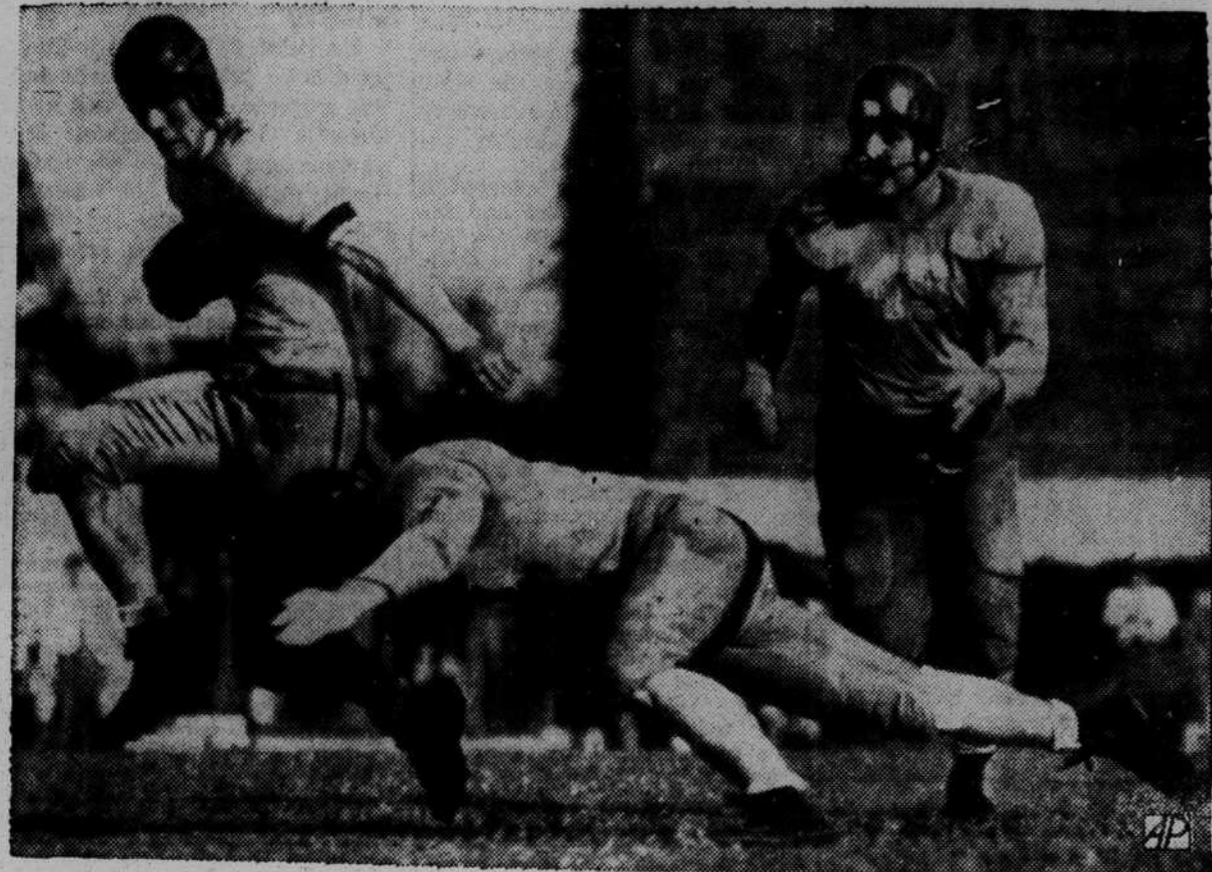


Deacs Invade Carolina For Traditional Game Saturday

Middies' Dec. 1 Tilt With Army Looms As Championship Contest

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Now that Navy's intricate "T" machine finally has begun to click, the Middies' Dec. 1 Clash with all-conquering army begins to shape up as a first rate championship contest.

The Midshipmen served notice on the Cadets that they will be ready to roll in the Philadelphia fracas by the ease with which they bowled over the Spunk Michigan club, 33-7, at Baltimore Saturday.

The Navy's harnessed power will be unleashed Saturday against poor little Wisconsin, beaten and battered 28-14 by Northwestern. This Baltimore tilt is Navy's last prep before the "big game" and the Middies' first breather since the opener against the Villanova many weeks ago. Commr. Oscar Hagberg will be seeking to iron out any existing kinks in his machine.

Meanwhile, the Army, looking bigger and better than ever after their awesome 48-0 walloping of Notre Dame which made them the first Cadet corps in history to beat the Irish two straight, journeys to Philadelphia to take on Pennsylvania. The Quakers, beaten only by Navy, showed they were the class of the east, not counting the service teams of course, by knocking Columbia's light Lions from the ranks of the unbeaten and untied teams by a 32-7 count.

EASTERN FRAY
Important eastern fray pits Holy Cross, one of the six major elvens left with unmarred records, against the deflated Temple Owls, who were dropped from the all-conference ranks 27-0 by Penn State.

Penn State travels to Michigan State to meet the Spartans, 27-7 losers to Great Lakes.

In other significant games this week, St. Mary's Gaels, sole Pacific Coast eleven with a perfect record, jousts with U.C.L.A. which is now back in the running for the Rose Bowl as a result of Oregon State's 7-6 upset of Washington; Notre Dame collides with Northwestern; Oklahoma plays Missouri for the big six championship; Indiana, assured of at least a tie for the big ten title following its 49-0 rout of Minnesota, meets Pittsburg, loser by 14-0 to Ohio State; the Buckeyes go back to big ten competition against Illinois, 48-7 trouncers of Iowa; Purdue opposes Michigan; Oklahoma's Aggies, the Missouri Valley crown all wrapped up since their 12-6 win over Tulsa will try and bring some order in the southwest conference by meeting T.C.U. and Rice respectively.

Right Of Entry Raleigh-Durham Army Field Granted

RALEIGH, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Immediate right of entry to the Raleigh-Durham Army Airfield, pending the execution of formal license, has been granted to the Raleigh-Durham Airport Authority, Chairman John P. Swain said last night.

Swain said the authority will issue a call immediately for bids for contracts to remodel a section of the present hangar at the airport in order to house facilities of the Pennsylvania Central Airline and the Eastern Airlines, pending erection of permanent buildings.

Swain said the airport now represents an investment of \$3,160,000, of which the federal government has expended \$3,000,000, and the cities of Raleigh and Durham and the counties of Wake and Durham, the remainder. Further expenditures of \$500,000 on the airport are now under consideration, he said.

N. C. Newspaper Awards Out For 1946

CHAPEL HILL, Nov. 12.—(AP)—The North Carolina Press Association has voted to dispense with the usual awards to daily and weekly newspapers for 1946.

However, the association's executive committee announced, a committee has been named to report to the January meeting of the association which will be held in Chapel Hill the 24 and 25—and make recommendations for future awarded beginning in 1947. The group also voted to publish a new directory of N. C. newspapers early next year.

GREEN BAY VIRTUALLY OUT OF PRO RACE

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—(AP)—It will be at least two weeks before the principals in the National Football league intersectional title playoff can be determined—and there isn't any surety today about which clubs will be named then.

Green Bay, the defending champion, is virtually out of any title consideration. Cleveland and Detroit are tied for the lead in the western section. Philadelphia, in second place in the eastern division, still has a chance to get into the playoffs although trailing Washington.

Cleveland and Detroit each has won six games and lost one. The two meet at Detroit a week from Thursday. Thanksgiving day Washington has won five and lost one, while Philadelphia has won four and lost two for second place in the eastern section. Those two meet at Philadelphia Nov. 25 in a game that can throw the eastern division squabble into a tie.

STAY ON TOP

Detroit and Cleveland stayed on top of the western division standings yesterday by dumping over two teams given a chance to further upset the standings in an already crazy title chase. Detroit beat the vastly improved Chicago Bears, 35 to 28, while Cleveland handed Green Bay a 20-7 beating.

Meanwhile, Washington was scoring 28 points in the last period to beat the Boston Yanks, 34 to 7. Philadelphia romped over New York, 38-17, with 17 points in the second quarter and 14 in the final period.

COMES FROM BEHIND

Detroit had to come from behind to beat the Chicago Bears and stay in a tie for first place with Cleveland. The Bears were ahead 21-7 in the third period, after scoring twice in the second, but the Lions stormed back twice in the final quarter.

Philadelphia stayed in the running for the eastern division crown when Steve Van Buren combined his ball-carrying with the pass combination of Roy Zimmerman to Jack Ferrante for an easy victory.

In the only other game, Pittsburgh dumped the Chicago Cardinals, 23-0, in what was the biggest upset in the league yesterday

SHRINE COACHES SELECT PLAYERS

CHARLOTTE, Nov. 12.—Coaches of the North Carolina and South Carolina teams which will meet in the ninth annual Shrine Bowl football game here Saturday Dec. 8, met here Saturday and yesterday to select their squads.

Players chosen for the two 23-player squads will receive invitations this week for Director W. F. Hanks. After invitations are confirmed by players and their school authorities, the names will be announced. All players will be high school seniors.

Paul Waggoner of Greenville Parker heads the South Carolina staff, assisted by Joe Collins of Chester and J. C. Booser of Ninety Six. The North Carolina staff is headed by Bill Brannin of Charlotte Central, assisted by Reid Station of Winston-Salem Hanes and Leon Brogden of Wilmington.

Coach Pasco Gettle of Charlotte Harding met with the Palmetto coaches as an adviser and Director Hanks with the Tar Heel mentors in their two-day session. The coaches reported evenly-balanced squads were chosen, with not as many backfield men being nominated as usual, and predicted strong teams for the annual clash here, proceeds of which go to the Shrine Crippled Children's Home at Greenville, S. C.

CLEMSON HEADS FOR TULANE AT NEW ORLEANS

N. C. State To Be Host To Miami At Raleigh Friday Night

Wake Forest's invasion of Chapel Hill for its traditional game with North Carolina and Clemson's visit to New Orleans for a clash with Tulane's Green Wave will highlight the coming week-end of football for Carolinas teams.

The Wake Forest-North Carolina game, a southern conference contest, is expected to draw the biggest crowd of any tilt in the Carolinas. The Tarheels had a close call last Saturday, edging out William and Mary, 6-0, at Williamsburg; the Deacons had an open date.

Clemson, 35-0 winner over Virginia Tech in its last Saturday engagement, will make a determined bid for victory over Tulane. The Wave lost to Georgia Tech, 41-7, last Saturday.

STATE SEES MIAMI

Another Carolina member of the southern conference, N. C. State, will furnish the Friday night opposition for Miami university on the latter's home grounds. State bowed to Duke, 28-13, in a Saturday afternoon game; the Miamians battled to a 13-13 tie with South Carolina last Friday night.

Another game next Friday night will pit the Oak Grove Marines against the First Army at Fort Bragg.

Saturday afternoon gridiron struggles will match Catawba's Indians against Virginia Military Institute at Lexington, Va.; and Presbyterian college of Clinton, S. C., against the University of Florida at Gainesville, Fla.

One game between service teams is scheduled next Sunday afternoon, with Camp Peary, Va., invading Cherry Point for a clash with the Flying Marines. The week-end schedule will be completed Monday when the PDC Comets of Greensboro journey to Miami, Fla., for an encounter with the Army Air Forces team of Opelika.

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CHEWNING STILL LEADS SCORING

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 12.—(AP)—For the second consecutive week Virginia Military Institute's twinkle-toed backfield star, Lynn Chewning, remains out in front among individual scorers in the Southern Conference with 54 points.

The 190-pound Richmond freshman line puncher and punter was field scoreless Saturday when the Keydets took a 38-0 lacing from the University of Maryland but his count remains 11 points better than any other scorer in the circuit.

Maryland's top candidates for scoring honors follow Chewning. Fullback Harry Bonk and Halfback Bill Poling both are tied with 43. Bonk collected one six pointer from the Keydets and Poling's count remained unchanged from the previous week. Both teams have played seven games this season.

CLARK TRAILS
Tommy Korzcowski, William and Mary halfback remains up among the leaders even though he hasn't added anything to his score since he tallied six points against VMI back on Oct. 20 to bring his total to 42 points. Also, George Clark concluded his season with Duke and left as a Navy ensign after scoring the same number.

Others among the high scorers include Bobby Thomason, VMI's passer, and Dutch Brems, of South Carolina, both of whom have 37 points and Howard Turner, of North Carolina State, with 36. Brems added one point against Miami University Friday night to bring his total to its present mark.

Turner stepped across the Duke goal line Saturday to score his latest touchdown after a run of 105 yards. It was the longest run of the game and one of two Wolfpack touchdowns.

Stranahan To Play In Azalea City Open

MOBILE, ALA., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Frank Stranahan, amateur ex-serviceman from Toledo, Ohio, who won the Durham open golf title, has notified officials here he will participate in the \$10,000 Azalea city open tournament which begins Thursday.

Others who will participate include Lt. Gary Middlecott of Memphis, winner of the recent North and South tournament at Pinehurst, N. C., and Freddie Haas of New Orleans.

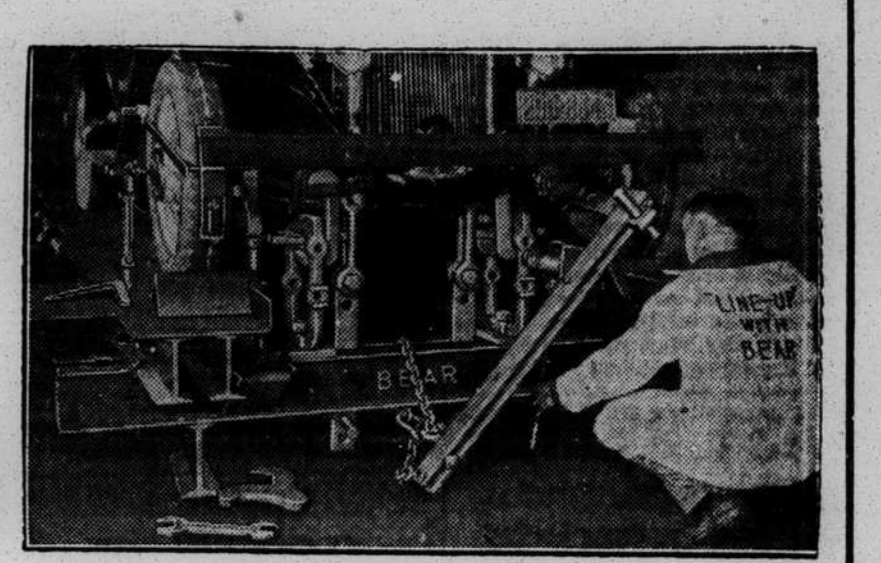
