First \$12,000 Maturing Sold At Flat Interest Rate Of 1 Per Cent

Chairman Glee A. Bridges, of the Cleveland county board of com-Cleveland register of deeds, have just affixed their signatures to fifty one-thousand dollar bonds of the Eliazbeth school district and these bonds have been forwarded Raleigh for the signature of W. E. Easterling, of the local government commission, by Henry Edwards, attorney for the board of commissioners.
