Perhaps he thought of some far-off home in France, where a brother or sister might be playing in the sun-shine like the poor Kabyle child who smiled unconscious of the threatening musket. Perhaps it was merely his better nature touched by that smile. I know not how this was, but I do know that the Zouave, laying down his musket on the ground, secured the child on his back with his turban, and then rushed forward on his way. The poor baby was thus borne through the thickest of the fray, but it seemed to have a charmed life. The balls whistled harmlessly by it; and though that night the brave Zouave was found lying on his face, with a ball through his brain, the child was asleep and unharmed. It was subsequently adopted by the officers of the regiment, and is yet alive. —*Sketches of Algeria.*

Horrible Massacre.

The Rev. Mr. Kliffman, a Methodist missionary, who has been preaching to the Indians of Oregon since 1833, was murdered with his family, not long since, under singular and appalling circumstances. The smallpox having broke out among the savages, while the missionary's family were not attacked, the former thought the pestilence had been introduced by the whites with the intention of exterminating the red race. Acting upon this horrible suspicion, their next step was revenge. A bold chief was selected for the deed, who stole into the chamber of the sleeping family and buried

his tomahawk in the brain of the missionary and that of his wife, and then other Indians rushed in and helpless children, male and female employees were butchered, the house razed to the ground, fences destroyed, and every vestige of once happy home disappeared.

Washington, March 6.—The Senate to-day confirmed the appointment of Joseph Holt, present Commissioner of Patents, as Post Master General; Bartholomew Fuller, of North Carolina, 5th Auditor; John Pettit, of Indiana, Chief Justice of Kansas; and ex-Senator Jones of Iowa, Minister to Bogota.
