

The Paraguay Expedition.

Advices from Buenos Ayres to the 27th January, state that the steamer Fulton, with Commissioner Bowlin on board, was stopped at Fort Itapuru, Paraguay, where he met Commissioner Lopez, who was authorized to make a treaty similar to those made with England, France and Sardinia. All agreed to meet at Corrientes on the 1st February. Commissioner Bowlin expresses strong hopes of an amicable arrangement.

Died at the Age of 132.

At the extreme old age of 132, old Sam Prior, the patriarch of the negro population of this city, died on Saturday last. Up to the latest day of his life his memory of persons and events anterior to and during the Revolution was very distinct. -Pet. Press.

Liquor Drinking in California.

The Sacramento Register says: The largest liquor dealers in San Francisco have estimated that the daily consumption of liquors in this State amounts to about 8000 gallons per day. Assuming that there are 500,000 inhabitants in the State, each would have an allowance of 5 gallons per day, at that rate; and the annual consumption would be 2,880,000 gallons.

Steamboat Collision - Loss of Life.

CINCINNATI, Mar. 29. The steamer Nat Holmes, bound to St. Louis, with 150 emigrants for Pike's Peak, came in collision with the steamer David Gibson, bound for Cincinnati, with a cargo of sugar and molasses, opposite Aurora, Indiana, last night. Both steamers were sunk. The cabins floated off, but 15 or 20 persons are supposed to be lost.
