It has become our duty (among the most painful of our life) to announce the death of our lamented fellow-citizen, Wm. R. Chapin, Esq. Cashier of the Bank of Virginia at this place.  
The tribute of respect to his memory, given by the Friends Society, will meet a full response from the bosom of all who had the happiness of his acquaintance and friendship; and the universal grief which this untimely intelligence has thrown upon our citizens, evinces at once, the high estimation in which he was held, and the magnitude of the loss which society has sustained by his untimely dissolution.  
Mr. Chapin, in the hope of restoring his shattered constitution, and to obtain the necessary relaxation from his arduous official labors, was on a visit to the Springs. But alas! this hope was but too soon to yield to the reality, that his days were numbered. The flickering ray of life, which for months, had been gleaming a fainter and yet fainter light, ceasing for short intervals and animating our hopes, by occasional, but specious appearances of renovated vigor, was finally extinguished on the 9th inst. A most interesting and estimable family are left, yearning deeply to deplore their loss—alas! inestimable.  
At the residence of the Rev. Mr. Kabler, near Lynchburg, on Sunday night last, Rev. Edward Cannon, who had been for a long period an active member of the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and who, for the last ten or twelve years, laboring under a constantly increasing debility, had been a resident of Lynchburg. Few men have attained a higher reputation, in the Church to which he was attached as an extensively-read and sound theologian, than the subject of this notice. Few had "searched the scriptures" with more untiring patience and assiduity, or with a stronger anxiety to learn the whole will of God; and it is believed that not one was more fully imbued with the spirit of the Gospel, or was more thoroughly furnished with scriptural good word and work, than was the "sole Minister of the New Testament." But neither extensive knowledge nor ardent piety can avert the stroke of Death; and our brother, full of years and of that honor which cometh from God, hath been summoned from the walls of Zion to the inner court of the Master's temple. Shall we regard at this dispensation of Providence, as a mere "accident," because the "ripeness of wheat" hath been separated from its stalk, and deposited in the garner abroad? Shall we mourn, that the soldier hath laid aside his armor, and is now receiving the reward of his fidelity and valor? Rather let us rejoice that the feeble veteran hath been relieved from his earthly toils, and is now in the full enjoyment of that rest which remains for the people of God.—The deceased was left a widow and three children—who, sorrowing as those who have no hope, have before them the stimulus of his bright example, which, if they follow, as he followed Christ, will retain them in that eternal world, where the pang of separation from those we love, are never felt.—Lynchburg Virginian.
