By the Governor of North Carolina.

200 Dollars Reward.

WHEREAS it has been made known to me, by the verdict of an Inquest held by a Justice of the Peace, that Ferebe Howell, late of New Hanover county, was recently murdered in said county, and that NEEDHAM HOWELL stands charged with the commission of the said felony; and whereas it is represented that the said Needham Howell is a fugitive from justice:

Now, therefore to the end that the said Needham Howell may be apprehended and brought to trial, I have thought proper to issue this my Proclamation, offering a reward of two hundred dollars to any person or persons, who will apprehend and confine him in the jail, or deliver him to the sheriff, of New-Hanover county: and I do, moreover, hereby require all officers whether civil or military, within this State, to use their best exertions to apprehend or cause to be apprehended, the aforesaid fugitive.
