You can have no idea of the state of thirgs in this state: everything looks worse and worse In severals of the counties, they have quashed all the bonds-in others there are no courtsin others the sheriffs pocket all the money and refuse to pay to any one. Indeed the officers & Sub-treasurers are quite willing "to take the responsibility." I do pity, from my heart, the merchants in this state, they can't collect any thing-the only money collected is by foreigners in the U. States Court. The Legislature in their superlative wisdom last winter, repealed the law authorising the County Courts to have special terms to finish the business that they have been in the habit of doing after the time had expired. Now, in the several counties, they manage to have the whole time of the court occupied with the criminal docket, and by the time they fiinish that, the term has exp red. In Gallatin, Copian County, I saw a white man receive 39 lashes for stealing a hog from the woods-and the day before a man for murder was just branded on the hand-the same week, a man for deliberate murder, had a verdict by a jury of manslaughter, and has not yet been sentenced. There is no prison, and three men by the name of Scott, (one of them had killed E B Hatch) volunteered their services to guard the prisoner. He protested to the court, stating that he was afraid of his life. The Judge ordered the sheriff to procure other persons for a guard ; but he 'took the :esponsi bility' of refusing to do it, and was fined the enermous sum 50 dollars! Well, at night, the Scotts took out the man and literally cut him to pieces with their bowie knives. After shooting him, one arm was cut off and they left him in the street and fled. The deceased had killed their uncle. They were all married men and two of the Scotts are well off The Judge in that county has quashed all the bonds, so that every thing that was well secured is now donotful. MEXICO AND TEXAS.

It is now a question of considerable imporance, whether Mexico, having adjusted her dif ficulties with France, and disposed of the insurgent forces under Mexia and Urrea, will not regard it as a favorable moment to make a new attempt for the recovery of Texas. The Govercment have now a large body of troops under arms, flushed with victory, (such as it is,) and why should they not gather fresh laurels in Texas? The very cold reception given to General Bee the Texian Envoy sent to Mexico to negotiate for the acknowledgement of Texian Independence, or rather his being refused permission to land, and threatened with imprisonment, seems to imply that another expedition is intend-ed. If so, it will be a formidable one. But, on the other hand. Texas is vastly better prepared to meet it than she was in 1837, having a well organized government, and a great increase of population. Texas could now muster 15,000 or 20,000 fighting men, of the true Anglo-Saxon mettle; and with such men, on any thing like equal terms, the Mexicans never can cope. We should regret to see a new expedition set on foot, because it would occasion distress and bloodshed to both the contending parties; but beyond this we have no fear. Mexico cannot re-conquer Texas. She could not if Texas was an insulated community; still less can she do it as the case stands at present.

CHOCTAW AGENCY, May 14, 1839. DEAR SIR: A murder, which is so unusual in this quarter, (I never knew of one before,) has just taken place in the Choctaw nation. Two men, one by the name of Crump, the other Backus, both from Mississippi, left the depot at Boggy, a few days since for this place. They were murdered about twenty miles from where they started. A mule which they led, was found dead a few hundred yards from where Crump lay, shot nearly through with an arrow, such as is used by the wild Indians; at all events. not such as either the Choctaws, Chickasaws, or any other of our friendly Indians use. There was also found a bow near where Backus lay. He had run perhaps two hundred yards, and was tomahawked. The only hope of ascertaining the murdeters is from the bow and arrow left. There are a number of Kickapoos and Osages hunting on Blue and Washita. There is some suspicion that they may be concerned.
